Injurious.

In an experimental observation of thirty-eight boys of all classes of society, and of average health, who had been using tobacco for periods ranging from two months to two years, twenty-seven showed severe injury to the constitution and insufficient growth; thirty-two showed the existence of irregularity of the heart's action, disordered stomach, cough, and a craving for alcohol; thirteen had intermittency of the pulse, and one had consumption. After they had abandoned the use of tobacco, within six months' time one half were free from all their former symptoms, and the remainder had recovered by the end of the year.

Small lots of choice brought from 25 to 28 cents last week. Eggs took a little rise for Easter, but as the hens were at work early in the season, egg eaters were not as ravenous as usual. If you want strong prices come along to market when the roads are heavy.

PRICES STILL LOW.—All over the United States the potatoe market remains glutted. This has been the case since January, and those of our merchants who entered into the shipment of potatoes in previous years are unable to forward the tubers to the American markets at a profit. A farmer to have proper remuneration for raising potatoes ought to be able to command \$1.25 per barrel, but today they are scarcely worth more than half that price.
