

INTERNATIONAL LESSON.

Second Quarter-Lesson 1.-April 7. THE TRIUMPHAL ENTRY.-Mark 11: 1-11.

GOLDEN TEXT.-Rejoice greatly, O daughter of Zion; shout, O daughter of Jerusalem: behold, thy king cometh unto thee.-Zech. 9: 9.

INTERVENING EVENTS.-Many interesting events took place, between the last lesson and this. After the blind Bartimeus had received his sight Zacheus was converted, and Jesus lodged at his house. There Jesus spake the parable of the pounds. He left Jericho, and reached Bethany on the evening of Friday. There he spent his last earthly Sabbath; and in the evening, the Sabbath being over at sunset, he sat down to a festal meal provided by the sisters of Lazarus. At this feast he was anointed by Mary; and during the night a council of the Jews was convened to consider the propriety of putting, not him only, but Lazarus also to death.

The next morning, after the quiet Sabbath spent in Bethany with his beloved friends, Jesus prepares to enter Jerusalem. Bethany was on the road from Jericho to Jerusalem. Now came Jesus' opportunity to fulfill an ancient prophecy of the Messiah, to publicly avow his mission as king and Messiah in the true, lowly, and peaceful way, and thus to set before the people a type of his real triumph yet to come.

PREPARATIONS FOR THE TRIUMPHAL ENTRY.-Vers. 1-6. And when they came nigh to Jerusalem. He went from Bethany by the southern of the three roads over Olivet, and had come to the outskirts of Bethphage a small village not far from Bethany, a village nearly two miles east from Jerusalem. It was on the eastern slope of the mount of Olives, "a hill east of Jerusalem, so called from the olive-trees upon it. It was about a mile from the city. He sendeth forth two of his disciples. Very likely Peter and John. Go your way into the village (Bethphage) over against you: and probably then in sight. Ye shall find a colt: an ass's colt, the mother being with it. Tied: by a gate or door in the open road. Whereon never man sat. Animals not previously used for labor were accounted specially pure and fit for sacred services.

And if any man say unto you: as the owner or his friends at hand would be likely to do. Say ye that the Lord hath need of him. The inference is that the owner of the ass was an adherent of Jesus. The number of secret followers was probably large. And straightway he will send him thither. He will give permission to the disciples to take him. The Rev. Ver. translates, and straightway he (Jesus) will send him back thither. "The idea is not, as commonly understood, that the owners will at once give up the animal, but a promise that the Lord would, without delay return the animal. And certain of them that stood there, said unto them, What do ye, etc. Equivalent to saying, What do ye mean by unfastening him? And they (the owners) let them (the two disciples) go: let them alone to do what they wished. All this was in order to fulfill a prophecy uttered 600 years before. (1) Jesus here manifests his divine omniscience. He knew just what would take place. (2) Jesus shows royal authority, taking for his use what was necessary, as kings were accustomed to do; and yet not overriding the rights of others.

THE TRIUMPHAL PROCESSION OF THE PRINCE OF PEACE.-Vers. 7-10. And they brought the colt to Jesus. This was the only time recorded that Jesus rode. And cast their garments on him; instead of a saddle. An animal to be ridden by a monarch was often covered with splendid clothes. Lacking these, the disciples took off their own outer garments and put them on the colt. And many. Crowds from the city, and of pilgrims from all parts thronging into the city. Spread their garments in the way. Thus manifesting their high idea of our Lord. And others cut down branches off the trees. It was a simple and interesting mode of decorating the road, and manifesting respect. And they that went before, and they that followed, cried, saying, Hosanna. "Hosanna" is a rendering in Greek of the Hebrew words, "Save, we pray!" It is like a shout of "Salvation! Salvation!" It is used as an expression of praise, like "Hallelujah," or "Hail." Blessed is he that cometh in the name of the Lord. Christ came in the name of the Lord, his ambassador. Blessed be the kingdom of our father David, that cometh. This recognizes clearly that Christ's kingdom is the continuation of the old kingdom of God's people. Hosanna and high-

est. In the highest degree; in the highest strains.

This event was the nearest to a triumphant progress that Jesus ever made on this earth. Yet, in reality, it was a very simple affair. With a few plain disciples, and a number of very simple people who sang his praises, he entered the city as unlike a conqueror as possible. There is to be a great triumphal procession in which Jesus will one day be the leader; in that day he will call forth all his resources, and will march in real triumph! The great procession of the universe is yet to come; for the day is coming when the Son of man will return to this earth "in his glory, and all the angels with him." At that time heaven shall be drained of all its resources to make that procession worthy of the Son of God. Prophecy had foretold his coming in humility, and it came to pass. But prophecy has also told of his coming again in glory, and that, too shall come to pass.

SORROW AMID REJOICING.-Luke 19: 41-44. As they descend from the summit of the Mount of Olives, the glories of Jerusalem in all its splendor burst upon Jesus' view. Here, though others shouted, his own soul was full of sorrow, and he wept over the city: (1) on account of the sins of its people; (2) because of the sorrows and desolation that were to come upon it. Even in the midst of our rejoicing over the triumphs of Christianity, we should weep over those who will not come and be saved.

RECEPTION AT JERUSALEM.-Ver. 11. And Jesus entered into Jerusalem: Matthew says that the whole city was stirred, the people asking, Who is this? and the accompanying crowds answering, This is the Prophet, Jesus from Nazareth of Galilee. Into the temple. He went to the temple that the prophecy might be fulfilled (Mal. 3: 1-3.) Here the lame and the blind gathered around him, and he healed them. And when he had looked round about. This was done to ascertain what abuses had crept into the temple worship. The chief priests and scribes were highly displeased (Matt 21: 15.) The Pharisees had already asked Jesus on the way to make his disciples stop their hosannas (Luke 19: 39, 40.) Thus ever the wicked seek the charity wheels of Salvation. We learn from Matt. 21: 15, 16, that the children joined in the hosannas in the temple. So should they ever do. For Jesus is the children's Saviour. And the church, too, should take great pains to have the children join in the praises of the sanctuary. He went out into Bethany: to the home of Lazarus and Martha and Mary. He went there every evening of this week, till the night before the crucifixion.

PRACTICAL HINTS.

We should be ready to go wherever Jesus bids us.

Whatever of ours the Lord has need of, we should gladly yield to his service.

The Lord returns all that he borrows of us, and a great deal more.

Whatever we do, we may expect to find some who will object to our course.

Greatness is always lowly.

Jesus is the king of the whole earth; but he is the Prince of Peace.

This triumphal procession was a dim foreshadowing of the triumph of the Gospel; Jesus is riding through the centuries.

We should cast our garments, wealth, talents, character, deeds of love, before Jesus our king.

It is a great privilege to honor Jesus as our king and to utter his praise.

It is a good thing to be enthusiastic in religious work.
