Self-Reliance.

The action of the electors of the new city of St. John the other day in refusing to part with the control of their harbor and to put it in the hands of the Government is the first exhibition of self-reliance we have had for some time, and comes from a very unexpected quarter, which is due no doubt to the new life that has been infused into our sister city since the union last spring, and since the completion of the Short Line railway which appears to be helping its trade. This want of self-reliance has always been more or less felt in Canada. Having always been colonies of Great Britain the people of the various provinces have to a greater or less extent felt their dependence on the mother country. Down to the Union of the Provinces we know in this city how much our merchants and others expected from the presence of British troops, and how dead the place was for years after they were withdrawn, until they felt they must rely upon themselves and their own brains and their own industry to make a living for themselves and families, and to build up the place. And when they realized this the public know how much we have accomplished notwithstanding the withdrawal of the British troops, the removal of several of the principal public departments of Government to Ottawa, and that we have been deprived of much of the prestige as a city in consequence. The first ten years were comparatively dull until the people realized the importance of putting their own shoulders to the wheel, and the result has been the establishing of new lines of industry, giving plenty of employment to the people, and the equipment of the city with all the improvements of the age, the consequence of well directed energy. At that time we had not even a railroad coming near us, now we have them taking us in all directions, with prospects of more of them. Then to bridge the St. John river seemed almost an impossible task to us; now we have two, and built in an incredibly short space of time. We merely refer to these things as showing what may be accomplished by people using their energy to good account and relying upon themselves; and yet we hear this eternal calling upon the Governments by some persons to come and help us, to take the control of our public works. To invoke Government assistance is all right and proper when the people are trying to help themselves and require pecuniary assistance for the carrying out of important undertakings. This is all very well, but to throw up the sponge and to fall back entirely on the Government presents to us a very cowardly and unself-reliant disposition. It is on this account we are pleased that the people of St. John have determined to manage their own harbor even if they have to obtain assistance from Government or other quarters by loan to put it in an efficient condition. While on this point we cannot refrain from remarking that the great danger to this country in its infancy is want of self-reliance. We are passing through that state now when every solid minded man wants to be placed where he can use his judgment and make himself felt. The growing influence of Canada will be a cause of jealousy and concern to those beyond our borders, and in building up the Dominion on a substantial foundation we will have much opposition and misrepresentation to fight against. This has already manifested itself, but our country speaks for itself in the varied character of its climate and richness of its soil, and its splendid resources and vastness. The future is ensured, but we cannot help remarking here, how much of talent and energy are shut up in Government offices all over the country, eking out a tedious and semi-idle existence, a large portion of these young men who must be more than the average in intelligence, of whose energy and ability the country is deprived through this want of self-reliance. If a thousand such were thrown into the active business of the country to become bread-winners and to use their various intellects and abilities for its good what a change there might be. However we do not want any of them dismissed but refer to this to show how greatly our young Dominion is suffering

from want of self-reliance. We feel in a position to speak upon this point because not being of the kind to be favored with such position we have been obliged to use our own exertions, and we can call attention to the REPORTER office at the present time fully equipped for work, turning out several newspapers and other work in abundance and employing many hands, as an instance of what can be done by others if they would rely upon themselves even with limited resources, and determine to make their venture a success. There is a chance for every man in Canada. There are many avenues for the ambitious business man to embark in trade, but he must have confidence in himself and his own ability to carry him through. We do trust this example of self-reliance shown by St. John will be emulated by the whole Dominion and that our people will feel full confidence in carving out their individual as well as political future.

THE ELECTIONS take place throughout France to-morrow, and although there is not said to be the excitement there was four years ago, Boulanger's latest and final manifesto is said to be of a most violent character, and will doubtless stir the people up. His lists show 1800 candidates for 500 arrondissements. M. Perry says the revision of the constitution means civil war. The Government appears to be very strong at present but elections take strange turns sometimes and the Boulangerists and conservatives may develop more strength than is generally expected.
