A good opportunity will be affordissue. Some time ago they sent out circulars asking the co-operation of all county councils in petitioning Parliament to prohibit the manufacture aud importation of liquors in Canada. The memorial has been adopted by the counties of Oxford, Wentworth, Elgin and Frontenac, and rejected by Leeds and Greenville by a vote of 16 to 18. The councils are meeting almost daily now in Ontario.

The only strength in liquor is that price of barley is only 90 cents per bushel including the cost of interest and storage, and as beer costs only 13 cents per keg to make, one as seven kegs of beer. Beer contains besides barley, drugs, solacylic acid, etc., hops and some glucose either of which it is fair to suppose cost about as much as the barley, then there being labor and storage to be counted, makes the barley go through seven times seven, or forty-nine kegs of beer for one bushel of barley, or if that is wrong, cut it in half and Baron Von Leibig's estimate is easily believed.—Southern Journal.
