Vandine his wife threw a bottle of whisky out of the window but it lodged in a snow bank without breaking. The Sergt. completed the job by emptying its contents in the snow. There would be scores of unhappy homes in Fredericton to-day were it not for the Scott Act.

SURE ENOUGH.—After four weeks without a drunk being reported at the police court the spell was broken on Christmas eve. Not a very wonderful circumstance in view of the fact that hundreds of young men were floating about for a holiday. This drunk was a young man who became very abusive to people on the street, and Constable Smith, after being kicked and scratched by his prisoner, succeeded in getting him to the lockup with the assistance of Constable Dunlap. There are two or three anti-Scott Act men in town yet, and while the prisoner was being conveyed to his cell, one of these with a grin all over his face said—"Ah, ah! where's your Scott Act now, a nice law that is when a man can get drunk." Sure enough, suppose we get it repealed at once.

WINTER TIME TABLE.—Travellers should consult the railway time tables now. By the winter arrangements mails will not be received in Fredericton until after dinner, and the evening train will arrive an hour earlier than usual. By the winter time table of the New Brunswick railway, which comes into effect on Monday, trains will leave Fredericton as follows: express for St. John and intermediate points at 7 a. m. (standard time), for Fredericton Junction, St. John and points east, Vanceboro, Bangor, and the west, St. Stephen, St. Andrews, Houlton, and Woodstock, at 10 a. m.; for Fredericton Junction and St. John; connecting at the Junction with the fast express via the Short Line for Montreal and the west at 2.55 p. m. The hours of arrival will be 12.45 2.10 and 6.40 p. m. On the Gibson branch the mixed train for Woodstock will leave at 7.15 a. m., and the train from Woodstock will arrive at 5.15.

Buried Alive.

At Lancaster near St. John, on Christmas eve an unfortunate man named James Magee lost his life. A general alarm was given and hundreds of people rushed to the scene. A depth of 40 feet was reached when the accident occurred. Magee loosened the earth, placed it in buckets and it was hoisted to the surface by a horse, driven by Chas. Robinson. Mr. Carpenter was at the top of the well upsetting the buckets as they reached the surface. Magee descended to the bottom by means of fragile ladders, on which very few men would have trusted their lives. At four o'clock in the afternoon a bucket of earth reached the top and Mr. Carpenter turned around to empty its contents. As he did so he heard Magee call out and looking down saw the sandy earth roll in over the poor man, covering him up to a depth of nearly ten feet. Gilbert Murdock, C. E., and A. Chipman Smith, chief of the board of works, with several of their men, in response to calls drove out from the city at once, tak-

ing with them the tools required, lanterns, etc. As soon as they reached the place Mr. Murdock saw it would be folly to endeavor to remove the earth from the man. In the first place it was unsafe for a man to go down into the well, and then again if any of the earth was removed there was danger of there being another cave in. In order to make the pressure less the earth was removed from around the top of the well—that is the earth which had been taken out of the well. Nothing else could be done in the darkness. The well was a dangerous looking place. The boxing was very frail and the bracing so insufficient size, it is a wonder the depth attained was ever reached.

An effort was made to give him air by putting a pipe down, but it could not be got down far enough to reach him. Soon after the accident Mr. Carpenter went down as far as the ladder reached and called out to Magee. The imprisoned man replied, begging that the earth be removed. Mr. Carpenter thought he heard Magee say that his legs were jammed. Later on another man went down and he heard Magee's voice, and as late as 10 o'clock his groans could be heard, although very indistinctly. No answer could be obtained to the questions put to him.

It is believed that the boxing and a couple of boards which Magee used in working have kept the earth from crushing him, as it would have otherwise have done. Willing hands are still trying to rescue the body.

Walking On The Water.

Boston, Dec. 21.—Prof. Oldrieve who started yesterday afternoon to walk from this city to Boston Light, on a wager of \$100, was picked up in the lower harbor this afternoon by the revenue cutter Hamlin and brought to this city. According to the professor's story he must have had a very narrow escape from death. He says that after passing Governor's Island at 4 p. m. yesterday, he had to struggle against wind and tide and he wandered about vainly endeavoring to reach land till 12.05 this morning, when almost exhausted he made a landing at Apple Island. There he staid until 8 o'clock with no shelter and with the wind blowing a gale across the bleak island.

At the latter hour he made an attempt to reach Governor's Island, but one of his shoes leaked and he was forced to return to the island. At 9.30 the city steamer J. Putnam Bradlee was signalled, but his signals were not answered. Finding some boards and a rope he rigged a raft and at 10 o'clock started in another attempt to reach Governor's Island by this means. The tide was too swift, however, and he was forced to put out to sea. His guiding pole became useless and was thrown away and the Professor was left to the mercy of the waves.

He drifted down and out the channel and out past buoy No. 6, where he was picked up by the revenue cutter on the inward trip. The professor was terribly exhausted and more dead than alive, but revived somewhat under the prompt treatment of the revenue officers. He was brought to this city and taken to his home in Chelsea. He says he will be all right in a few days and that no serious results will follow his eventful trip.

Drunkenness in France.

There is yet, here and there, a fossil who entertains the idea, that encouraging the use of "light French wines," and possible light beers would be a step towards "practical temperance." How this works in France itself may be judged by the following from the N. Y. Advocate: Alcoholism and crime go hand in hand in other countries as well as our own. The report of last International Congress for Suppression of Alcoholism, which was held in Paris from July 29th to August 1st, 1889, affirms that criminality and mental aberration follow a march parallel with the consumption of alcoholic beverages. It appears that during the last fifty years the consumption of alcohol in France has trebled, the number of lunatics has quadrupled, and that crime and suicide are steadily on the increase. It was stated that the number of crimes and offences against mortals is exactly in ratio with the consumption of alcohol. The one obvious lesson which the French people, and all others, must needs learn is the wisdom and duty of abstinence.

REMEMBERING THE PASTOR.—On Christmas eve the congregation of the Methodist Church in St. Stephen presented their pastor, Rev. R. W. Weddall, with a handsome gold watch. Mr. Weddall is very popular with his people and this is only one of many tokens given of their appreciation of his pastorate.

The Cook Only Escapes.

Few persons have an adequate idea of the nature of the work carried on in the lumber woods. Cutting trees and twitching the logs to the stream is mere mechanical work; it is the scalers upon whom great responsibility rests. A correspondent of the Gleaner the other day gave the following particulars respecting the work in Quebec. The surveying is in charge of Mr. Wood Ingraham, Shogomoc, York County. He has also an assistant, Mr. Arthur Dunham, of St. John. The scaling is no boss job in this country. The logs are all scaled by New Brunswick log rule, and then the Quebec Government to make the business more agreeable, make our scaler keep an account of the length of log size at butt, and also size at top, and that to be put on paper with pen and ink and sworn too. They have a scaler of their own also, and then a bush ranger to look after him, and a superintendent to look after him again, and then they swear all the bosses and the manager that "has not lied," "could not lie," nor "would not lie," if he could. I suppose next thing they will swear the Cook and the Cook's Devil, and perhaps the head swamper, "Jerry". It was rather a solemn occasion last evening, and appeared to impress the boys, to see Mr. LaPointe administer the oath to Geo. F. Burden, as to how many logs were hauled by one team in the month of October. The J. P. could not speak English and the other party could not understand French, while Alex. acted as interpreter. The firm have bought a number of logs from the settlers on the lands owned and paid for by the settlers, and now the Mercier Government have sent blank forms to swear how many logs they have sold.
