THE SALOON IN POLITICS.

The greatest political danger of the future is the saloon. Its power for corruption can scarcely be estimated. Its influence. always on the side of wrong against the side of right, always in the interests of evil, the most disreputable classes found in the scums of the cities. Its methods are complete and its devotion to its own interests is worthy of a better cause. Men imagine they see in other directions the hydra-head-

They talk knowingly of combinations in various branches of honorable business which they assert menace the perpetuity of the government; and in searching the honest branches of trade for hidden treasures entirely overlook an octopus which already has within its slimy grasp almost every large city of the United States. There is a beer trust beside which all other combinations become insignificant. The sugar trusts, cotton trusts, oil trusts and the hundreds of other trusts, existing and alleged, all together cannot equal the wealth and power of the brewers' association of the United States.

Robert Graham, secretary of the Church temperance society, has prepared a table showing that of the eight thousand saloons of New York City nearly one third are under the control of twenty brewing firms. The method of operation is as follows: The brewer selects the site of the saloon, pays for the license, puts in the stock and fixtures, and taking a chattel mortgage on the same renews it from year to year, so long as the saloon keeper buys his make of beer. Thus, while the business may be carried on under various firm names, it is really controlled by the brewers themselves. One brewery firm in New York holds six hundred such chattel mortgages and virtually controlls six hundred saloons. Another firm holds over two hundred like mortgages and the aggregate of all such mortgages is nearly five thousand, or more than onehalf of all the saloons in the city. The value of these mortgages is nearly five millions of dollars or an average of nearly \$1,000 each.

It is a fair estimate to say that each sa-

loon can control ten votes. Five thousand such saloons control fifty thousand votes, and all these are in the hands of the brewers' association. What party or candidates advocating principles of morality, tempertide of such overwhelming opposition?
