A Brief Sketch of the Order of the Sons of Temperance.

The Sons of Temperance is the oldest of the leading secret temperance societies. It was established to take the place of the Washingtonian movement which lacked important features wherewith to hold or bind its membership, thus negating very largely the wonderful work it had accomplished. Of the 600,000 who signed its pledge, 450,000 fell again before the tempter's power.

The first organization took place in New York on the 29th September, 1842, its objects being, as appears on the official records, "To shield its members from the evils of intemperance, to afford mutual assistance in case of sickness, and to elevate their characters as men."

The following, which is a copy of the call for the first meeting, will be interesting to members of all secret temperance associations, resulting as it did, in the formation of the original secret temperance society:—

Sons of Temperance, New York, Division, No. 1.

SIR:—You are invited to attend a select meeting at Teetotalers' Hall, No. 71, Division street, on Thursday evening, Sept. 29, 1842, at half-past seven o'clock.

The object of the meeting is to organize a beneficiary society, based upon total abstinence, bearing the above title. It is proposed to make the initiation fee at first \$1.00, and dues 6 1/4 cents a week; in case of sickness, a member to be entitled to \$4.00 a week, and in case of death, \$30 to be appropriated for funeral expenses.

A constitution will be submitted on the above evening, and if the principles adopted meet your approbation, you are invited to become a member of the Division. The enclosed ticket will procure you admission.

The meeting took place as appointed, sixteen persons being present; Daniel H. Sands was chosen chairman, and John W. Oliver, Secretary.

At an adjourned meeting, October 7th, the Society was fully organized, with D. H. Sands, W. P.; E. L. Snow, W. A.; J. W. Oliver, R. S.; James Ball, F. S.; Geo. McKibben, Treas.; Thomas Edgerly, Conductor Thomas Swenarton, I. S.

The idea of extending the Order was immediately conceived, and on the 27th of the following October, these Resolutions were adopted:—

Resolved, That individuals from Newark be received, with the understanding that a Division be formed there when the number is sufficient.

Resolved, That a committee of seven be appointed to prepare a constitution for the Fountain Head of the Sons of Temperance.

The Fountain Head, as the Grand Division was first called, met and adopted its constitution on the 7th December, following. On the 10th December, the G. D. was formally organized, and the following officers elected: D. H. Sands, G. W. P.; E. L. Snow, G. W. A.; J. W. Oliver, G. S.; James Ball, G. T.; Evan Griffith, G. Chap.; T. Edgerly, G. Con.; F. W. Wolfe, G. Sent.

A Division was instituted at Newark, N. J.; on Dec. 15, and a second in New York, Dec. 22d. So rapidly did the Order grow that in June, 1844, National Division was organized.

Ephraim L. Snow, so frequently mentioned above, a former resident of Boston, visited that city, and on May 14th, 1843, at Rotabite Hall, instituted Washington Division, No. 1. The first officers elected were W. S. Baxter, W. P.; Wm. R. Stacy, W. A.; Samuel Ellis, R. S.; W. Easterbrook, F. S.; Lewis Boutelle, Treas.

Heffield Division, No. 2, of Salem, was instituted by Samuel Edlis on 23d February, 1844. This Division is still alive and active, celebrating its 45th anniversary on 2d March last.—*Temperance Record.*

The New Jersey Liquor League, in session at Camden, Sept. 17, adopted resolutions asking for just liquor laws and a reasonable license fee.

—A prominent Chicago physician, says the *Lever*, has opened a private hospital for the treatment of professional and business men addicted to the drink habit.

The Church Vs The Saloon.

A Chicago physician declared in a recent speech: "If they are going to close the saloons, we insist that the churches shall also be closed on Sunday." This is just about the position into which the so-called "personal liberty" logic might be expected to lead a man. If the saloons are closed the churches must be closed! What a preposterous misapprehension of the purpose of law and Government! Why ought the Government to stop general business on Sunday? Because both the moral and the physical welfare of the community is enhanced thereby. Why should the saloons be closed on Sunday? Because their existence is at all times a detriment to the moral, physical and mental welfare of the people, and more so on Sunday than any other day. Why should the churches be permitted to keep open on Sunday? Because in the last resort good morals are based upon religious principles and cannot exist independently of them. Every community will be moral in exact proportion to the amount of genuine religion which it contains, and good morals are the only permanent foundation of free institutions.

—The *Indian Messenger*, of Calcutta, sounds a warning note of exhortation as follows: "We entreat the Government of India to put a total stop to the liquor traffic in this land before the liquor men can have such large majorities on their side here as they have in Pennsylvania and Rhode Island. The country is far from wholesale corruption, even yet. Let the rotten limb be cut off ere the disease spreads through the whole body."
