Germany's own papers and statistics refute the claim that little drunkenness exists in the beer-loving country. Witness the following current item from the German press: "Germany annually spends 430,000,-000 marks for its army, but not much less for its alcoholic drinks, which cost 406,000,000 marks. Statistics show that the intemperate class furnishes thirty per cent of all the insane, fifty per cent of all the poor, and seventy per cent of all the
