OTHER PROVINCES.

The government have authorized the minister of justice to discontinue proceedings in the cases of the David Adams and Ella M. Doughty, United States fishing vessels, which were libelled under the vice-admiralty court of Halifax for purchasing bait in the territorial waters of Canada.

Captain Warren, owner of four British Columbia vessels seized in Behring Sea last year, has been informed upon what terms he can bond his vessels out. The amount is over \$40,000.

Lord Lansdowne gave a brilliant reception in the senate chamber Saturday evening.

The Governor General has accepted the offer of a farewell banquet by the citizens of Ottawa. It is intended, however, to give a Dominion character by inviting the mayors of all Canadian cities to be present.

A passenger train which arrived at Winnipeg from the east Saturday, met with a serious accident at Markstay, near Sudbury Junction, owing to a broken rail.

Physicians were promptly on hand. The passengers in the sleeper were badly shaken but none were seriously injured.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN

An official bulletin from San Remo Sunday, says the Crown Prince slept well. His cough and exportation are less.

Steamer San Pablo arrived from Hong Kong and Yokohama, on Saturday, bringing additional details of the second disaster on Yellow river, December 4, which resulted in the drowning of three mandarins and 4,000 Chinese laborers.

A FEW USEFUL RECIPES.

MOLASSES BUTTER SCOTCH.—One cup of New Orleans molasses, one cup of brown sugar, one-half cup of butter. Boil until it snaps when dropped into cold water.

SCALLOPED CODFISH.—Mix together two teacups of mashed potatoes, 1 1/2 teacups of cold boiled codfish, 2 1/2 teacups of milk, one half egg, and one quarter of a teacup of butter; bake a light brown.

RICE PUDDING.—Three tablespoonfuls of dry rice, half a cup of sugar, one quart of milk, put in a pan, flavor with lemon or vanilla and bake in a slow oven four hours without stirring. Serve either hot or cold.

SUGAR CAKES.—Three coffee cups of sugar, five eggs and one cup of butter; beat very light, then add one nutmeg, grated, flour enough to roll, one-fourth of a cup of water and two teaspoons of baking powder.

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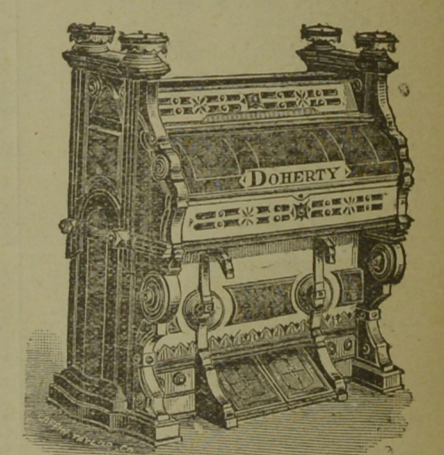
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
