

SIGNS OF VICTORY! EVERY PROVINCE WILL GIVE A LIBERAL MAJORITY.

Reports That Show the Way the Fight is Going in Different Sections.

(Special to The Liberal News.) TORONTO, Nov. 1.—Liberals claim a majority for Laurier in every province as follows: Ontario, 4; Quebec, 41; Nova Scotia, 10; New Brunswick, 3; Prince Edward Island, 2; Northwest Territories, 5; British Columbia, 3; Manitoba, 2; Liberal majority, 72. WINNIPEG, Nov. 1.—In Manitoba the Liberals expect to carry at least the representation. The Dauphin election is postponed, leaving nine contests for Thursday. Brandon is sure, Sifton being slated for victory by hundreds of majority. The Liberals will carry four other seats in the Territories. The Liberals are counting on seven sure seats, and the more optimistic look for a clean sweep. Doubtful ones for the government are Qu'Appelle, Calgary and Edmonton. MONTREAL, Nov. 1.—The Herald today publishes replies to questions from the various cabinet ministers. From Ontario, Quebec and the eastern provinces come uniform estimates of a great Liberal victory. From Ontario and New Brunswick comes especially encouraging news. MONTREAL, N.B., Nov. 1.—The outlook for a telling victory in New Brunswick was never brighter. Our friends are confident everywhere of making gains, and my best judgment coincides with that view. Signed H. R. Emmerson. VICTORY IN NEW BRUNSWICK. Bright Liberal Prospects in the Different Counties.

Not a Single Seat in Which the Tories are Sure of Success.

CAMPBELLTON, N.B., Nov. 1.—The closing days of the campaign have made clearer than ever the absurdity of the Conservative claim that they expect to carry this constituency. It is now apparent that Mr. Reid will have a majority of at least 500 over the Tory candidate, Mr. Mott. In every parish the indications are more favourable than they were in 1900 and the Liberals expect to carry this town, which is Mr. Mott's home, by a good majority. In Dalhousie, Balmoral and the lower parishes of the county, the Conservatives admit that it is a one-sided fight against them. Mr. Mott has not developed the strength that was shown by the Tory candidate, Mr. McAllister, in the last general election, and many beds have been placed that will lose his deposit. The estimate of at least 250 more than five hundred majority is therefore, a very conservative one. A THOUSAND MAJORITY. BATHURST, N.B., Nov. 1.—The campaign has been quiet but usual voting. The fact that even the most earnest Conservatives admit that it is only a question of a majority for the Liberal candidates, Mr. O. Ferguson, over Mr. Blanchard, who he defeated in 1900 by nearly 1,000 votes. No one expects Mr. Blanchard to save his deposit in this election. Gloucester can be counted upon as absolutely sure for the Liberals. NORTHUMBERLAND WILL BE CLOSE. NEWCASTLE, N.B., Nov. 1.—The idea that has been so diligently spread by the Conservative press outside this county that Mr. James Robinson, the Conservative candidate, would have an easy victory, is ridiculed here, where the workers on both sides understand that the campaign, while very close, is proving more favourable every day for W. S. Loggie, the nominee of the Liberal party. It must be remembered that Mr. Robinson has never been through an election before in which the Liberal party has had the support of its friends outside the constituency, for in 1900 it was known that the Hon. A. G. Blair was not only favourable to Mr. Robinson's return, but used all the power of his command to obtain his election. A candidate was put in the field by the Liberal party, yet many of the strongest Liberals in the county were induced by Mr. Blair to support the Tory nominee, so that Mr. Morrissey's defeat in 1900 was rather due to the nomination of Mr. Loggie's personal popularity and his extensive business interests, united with the zeal and diligence which he has shown in looking after the interests of his constituency at Fredericton, have all combined to this result. There is probably no man in the county of Northumberland more respected by all classes and parties than Mr. W. S. Loggie, the next member for the county in the parliament of Canada. A THREE CORNERED FIGHT. RICHMOND, N.B., Nov. 1.—The attempt of the Conservative party to split the Liberal vote by the nomination of Mr. Pascal Herbert as an independent candidate has utterly failed. Not only is the election of Hon. O. J. LeBlanc conceded by both Liberals and Conservatives, but his majority will be at least as great as in 1900, when he defeated George V. McNamee, his present opponent, by over 600 votes. The humour of the situation from the Liberal standpoint is that this result has been helped by the running of a third candidate, for it is certain Mr. Herbert will draw his vote mainly from Mr. McNamee rather than from Mr. LeBlanc. Kent will send Mr. McNamee back to St. John and will send O. J. LeBlanc to Ottawa to represent the constituency. EMMERSON WILL HAVE BIG MAJORITY. MONCTON, N.B., Nov. 1.—The situation in the province of New Brunswick can be safely summed up on the eve of the election as more favourable than it was in 1900. The returns from every constituency indicate that the Conservatives will not carry more than three seats in the province. In every constituency the closing days of the campaign have shown a marked tendency towards Liberal gains. Here in Westmorland the election of the Hon. H. R. Emmerson is secure beyond peradventure, and the report published by the Tory press in St. John, that there is a chance to defeat the minister is treated as a campaign joke in Westmorland. The Liberal News is safe in stating that Mr. Emmerson's majority will not be less than 800. Moncton and parish will probably give him 500. KING'S ALBERT MAY BE CLOSE. SUSSEX, N.B., Nov. 1.—The contest in the united constituencies of Albert and King will be fought here up to the closing of the polls on Thursday, and in this county the vote will be a close one between Mr. White and Mr. Fowler, each side claiming a majority of about 150. In Albert it is conceded that Mr. White will lead the poll. The Conservatives

DR. HAY SURE OF ELECTION. CHIPMAN, N.B., Nov. 1.—The story published in yesterday's Telegraph that the Liberal party had been elected in this parish for the purpose of doing crooked work is absolutely untrue, and has disgusted even the few Conservatives of this parish who recognize that while the parish of Chipman is overwhelmingly Liberal, no effort has ever been made to change the fact either by intimidating the minority or by any crooked work on polling day. The Liberal majorities in this parish have run as high as 325 out of a total vote of less than 400, but there has never been the slightest reason to suppose that the Liberal party will be elected in this parish. The presence of such men as Senator King at the polls here has always been a sufficient guarantee that the rights of the minority would be properly protected. It is conceded by both parties that Dr. Hay, the Liberal candidate, will have at least 500 majority in the parishes of Queen's and Sunbury on the eastern side of the river, and unless Mr. Wilmut takes a great deal bigger vote on the western side of the river than he did at the last election, he will be elected. Advice is given to the Conservatives in Wakefield, Brighton, Aberdeen, Kent, and Wilmut, that there will be increased Liberal majorities, while the Conservative majorities will be reduced. GREAT FIGHT IN CARLETON. WOODSTOCK, N.B., Nov. 1.—F. B. Carvell will be elected by at least 250 majority. This is the situation in a few words in this constituency. In Woodstock Mr. Carvell takes the lead in the history of the town, take out a Liberal majority. COSTIGAN WILL HAVE A SWEEP. GRAND FALLS, Nov. 1.—Hon. John Costigan is certain of election and the probabilities are that Mr. Manzer will lose his deposit. Mr. Manzer's candidature is treated as a joke throughout the united constituencies and while a few personal friends throughout the county of Victoria who have been instrumental in bringing Mr. Manzer out, will no doubt vote for him for shame's sake, the very fact that he is entirely unknown to the greater number of the electors would be a sufficient reason for the statement that he will receive no general support. In Madawaska Mr. Manzer will be beaten five to one. The fact that even such strong Conservatives as J. Allen Perley are actively for the Hon. John Costigan is sufficient for those who know this constituency to understand that his election is absolutely certain by a very large majority. GIBSON FOR YORK. FREDERICTON, N.B., Nov. 1.—All the claims of the Tories in regard to electing Mr. Crockett for this constituency are simply laughed at by well informed persons here. Mr. Crockett has no chance of becoming the representative of the county of York in the House of Commons and his supporters know it.
