

CAUGHT AFTER A LONG CHASE.

Fugitive Bookkeeper Sees a Good Part of the World Before He is Taken.

ST. PAUL, Oct. 24.—The police today captured Karl R. Kipp, formerly bookkeeper of the First National Bank of Saratoga Springs, N. Y., wanted for alleged embezzlement. Kipp was arrested in a room at the Lamar hotel, where he was stopping under the assumed guise of a travelling salesman. Kipp, who was a trusted employee of the bank, decamped Jan. 15, this year. An examination of his accounts showed that he had manipulated the books and pocketed \$12,000 of the bank's money.

SHOWED HER TOE.

Woman's Endeavor to Prove Her Identity and Ownership of Valuable Property Only Succeeds in Confusing Jurors and a Mistrial Results.

HOUSTON, Texas, Oct. 23.—Upon a woman's toe and toenail hangs the outcome of a suit involving lands in the centre of the Basson ranch, which she claims there is now a monthly income of \$6,000.

The woman says she is Mary Kingston, whose relatives for twenty years have believed her dead. She appeared a few weeks ago and said she was the mother of Miss Mary Kingston, who had been the undisputed owner of the property.

ATE HIMSELF INTO HIS GRAVE.

Devoured 85 Pounds of Meat in 20 Hours.

DUBUQUE, Ia., Oct. 26.—His stomach distended to three times its normal size after he had eaten eighty-five pounds of raw beef, "Phil" Melloy, who posed as the world's champion eater, died in terrible agony here. He was found dead on the floor of his bedroom by his wife, with his face distorted as if intense suffering had preceded death. A week ago Melloy issued a challenge to any man in the world to eat against him for a wager of \$500. Recently Melloy met some youths in a resort. Talk turned to his wonderful performances at eating, and Melloy boasted he could eat eighty-five pounds of beef in twenty hours. One of the young men in the party offered to bet Melloy \$100 that he could not eat the amount. Melloy hesitated, but finally said he would make the bet.

SCIENCE OF ONYCHOMANCY.

The latest science is, undoubtedly onychomancy, or the science of reading the fortune from the finger nails. According to the onychomancers, the tiny white specks which come and go on the nails are not the result of chance, but from them can be read "the past, present and future." These innocent looking specks are almost as difficult to decipher as the lines on the palm from which the palmist tells us so much. Their size, shape and position are all taken into account. The specks nearest the tip of the finger relate to the past, those in the centre to the present, and those on the half moon to the future. As in palmistry, the right hand has to be read in conjunction with the left, but a feature which gives this science an advantage over all its rivals is that these fateful specks are constantly coming and going. Consequently a number of readings at different times must be given to reach an accurate one. The revival of the science, for it is really not a recent one, is traced to a foreign source.
