#### CAUGHT AFTER A LONG CHASE.

Fugitive Bookkeeper Sees a Good Part of the World Before He is Taken.

ST. PAUL, Oct. 24.—The police to-day captured Karl R. Kipp, formerly bookkeeper of the First National Bank of Saratoga Springs, N. Y., wanted for alleged embezzlement. Kipp was arrested in a room at the Lamar hotel, where he was stopping under the assumed guise of a travelling salesman. Kipp, who was a trusted employee of the bank, decamped Jan. 15, this year. An examination of his accounts showed that he had manipulated the books and pocketed \$12,000 of the bank's money.

A constant search has been kept up for the man since his departure from Saratoga, but up to to-day he had avoided arrest. He has been spending his money freely and attracted attention by his munifience last night. Kipp is twenty-four years old and of boyish appear-

Kipp told the police the story of extensive travels since he left Saratoga Springs. He went first to New York city, and there took a steamer for London. Next he spent short periods of time in Boulogne, Paris and Marseilles, returning to London. From London he made the wide sweep to Regina, the capital of the Canadian Northwest Ter

itory, and from Regina came to St. Paul. He first registered at the Ryan, on Oct. 13, and a few days later went to the Lamar hotel. When searched only a little money and some jewels of no great value were found on him. He admitted to Chief O'-Connor that he was a heavy gambler. He had made and lost large sums, and he spent his money as fast as he made it.

This has received a great fillip from a renarkable lawsuit which came up during the past week. A discharged cloak-room attendant brought an action against the Carlton hotel for £83, which he claimed as his proportion of cloak-room tips appro priated by the hotel management.

The evidence showed that the claimant received five shillings a week as wages and his salary was made up by the weekly division of tips among the attendants according to their position and length of service. But before the employes of the cloakroom divided the contents of the cloak-room tip box the management each week deducted £13, to which it contended the employees had agreed. The claimant denied this statement, and the result was that the jury awarded him £50.

The Carlton hotel people are now very indignant at the revelations of the tipping system which prevails there.
