Affairs in Athens.

M. Ralli Assumes the Reins of Power.

ATHENS, April 29.—The Legislative Assembly, convoked in extraordinary session, assembled for the second time yesterday evening, and again adjourned owing to lack of a quorum, only 95 deputies being present and 104 being the number necessary to proceed with business. The adjournment last night was followed by much excitement and cries of disapproval from the galleries.
After the adjournment the Premier, M. Delyannis, had a long conference with the King, and the Opposition deputies held a prolonged meeting but they broke up without deciding upon a programme. A crowd of fully 10,000 people surrounded the Parliament House when the deputies assembled and many of the outsiders swarmed up the steps and invaded the vestibules. The throng there and other groups in the streets eagerly discussed the situation.
M. Ralli, the former Minister and Opposition leader, was among the first of the deputies to arrive. He was cheered and was accorded various other marks of sympathy, but the crowd generally maintained the sullen demeanor engendered by the painful news of the past few days.
The ministers reached the Parliament House in closed carriages, the crowd slowly opening a way to allow them to pass and respectfully saluting the occupants of the vehicles.
The public galleries of the House were thronged, among those present being many ladies and members of the diplomatic corps.
When the President of the Legislative Assembly, M. Zaimis, owing to the absence of a quorum, declared the sitting closed, the announcement was greeted with exclamations of impatience from the members of the Opposition and with cries of disapproval from the galleries. As the excitement increased M. Ralli, rising to his feet, motioned to his supporters to remain calm. His advice was followed and the deputies filed out of the House.
The Opposition deputies proceeded to a committee room where they consulted upon the failure of the session. The fruitless meeting was a very great disappointment to the crowds outside the House who were waiting to hear the result of the deliberations of the deputies. The Ministerialists declared it impossible to hope for a quorum being obtained this morning as many of the deputies will not be able to reach the capital in time for the session and several of the military

members being at the seat of war. On the other hand, the names of the Opposition quote the names of the supporters of the Government, who, although present in Athens yesterday evening, did not attend the assembling of the deputies in Parliament House.
After the sitting of yesterday the impatient crowds called upon the members of the Opposition to appear and make a statement. M. Panser, a well known member of the Opposition party in the Legislative Assembly, was specially called upon by the crowds to address them. But although he was apparently the first choice of the people it was M. Elladi who from the top of the steps leading into Parliament House, made a speech to the people.
M. Elladi said, in part:—In view of the desertion of the Government, the Chamber and the country look to the King to do his duty and safeguard public order. Have confidence in the Opposition, which is watching over the highest interest of the country. These words uttered with great emphasis and significance were greeted with frantic applause, and the applause was shortly afterward renewed upon the appearance of M. Ralli. The crowd gave the popular leader a tremendous ovation. Six thousand people escorted him to his house. On arriving there the crowds insisted upon a speech and M. Ralli appeared upon a balcony, whence he made a brief address, during the course of which he said:—
"The Government, by its desertion, has committed suicide. It is our duty to maintain order and show that we are now fighting for our homes."
This sentiment caused the crowds to burst into loud cheering after which the people slowly dispersed to their homes.
The King summoned M. Delyannis, the Premier, this morning and called upon him to tender his resignation. His Majesty subsequently entrusted the Opposition leaders with the task of forming a new Cabinet.
The following is the official list of the Cabinet Ministers as corrected this evening:—Premier and Minister of Marine, M. Ralli; Minister of War, M. Tsamavos; Minister of Finance, M. Sinopoulos; Minister of Education, M. Carapanos; Minister of the Interior, M. Teotaki. Demetrius Ralli, the new Premier and Minister of Marine, was the leader of the Opposition. He has been Minister of Justice and Minister of the Interior and is well known as an able lawyer and orator. He is 50 years old and studied at

the University of Athens and Paris. Admiral Camaris and M. Deligeoris as well as M. Sinopoulos, having declined portfolios, the new Ministry will take on a composite character and rely for its support upon a coalition of followers of M. Ralli and Trikoupiis.
The evening session of the Legislative Assembly was attended by only 40 Deputies. In the absence of a quorum the President adjourned the chamber, after which crowds gathered the streets shouting, "Long live Admiral Kanaris!" There was no other incident of importance.
After to-morrow's vote of confidence MM. Ralli and Sinopoulos will go to the Greek headquarters at Pharsalis. As soon as the new Cabinet is formed the Premier and Ministers of war and Marine will start for Pharsalis. The King has entrusted M. Delyannis the retiring Premier, with full powers to represent his Majesty during the formation of the new Cabinet, only insisting that M. Teotaki should enter the Cabinet. The leaders of the Opposition then went to Parliament House, where a meeting of the Opposition was held. The leaders afterwards had another conference and drew up a list of Ministers, which three of the leaders presented to the King. The names will be submitted to the Legislative Assembly to-morrow, and a vote of confidence will be asked for. It is believed that M. Delyannis will be President of the Chamber.

Greece Has Collapsed.

Mediation of the Powers Invoked.
ATHENS, May 10.—Greece has made a written application to the powers through their representatives here with a view of obtaining mediation. Turkey is inclined to support the powers in the facilitation of negotiations, but it declines to consent to an armistice.
The correspondent of the Associated Press says the position at Domokos is unchanged. Colonel Vassos and his party have started for Ejirus. Some mystery attaches to the circumstances under which he left Crete. The command of an Italian torpedo boat reported to Admiral Vassos and four companies in a boat off the island of Crete.
LONDON, May 10.—The Daily Telegraph's Athens correspondent says that Col. Valios told him he had great difficulty in leaving Crete, as all the foreign warships were on the alert. He departed from the island, he says, on a dark night after passing the two

previous nights in a cavern.
VIENNA, May 10.—It is reported here that Turkey's terms of peace with Greece include the payment of an indemnity of £3,000,000, a rearrangement of the Greek frontier, the annulling of the treaties favoring the Greeks, the cession of the Greek fleet to Turkey, and the settlement of the Cretan question.
Paris, May 10.—A semi official communication was published this afternoon which states that the establishment of peaceful relations between Greece and Turkey will not be attended by great difficulties, and will soon have a satisfactory issue. The powers. It is stated, had already agreed among themselves upon the condition of peace. Germany's hesitation was due to the fact that the Greek government, in a circular to its representatives at the courts of the powers, did not formally adhere to Cretan autonomy as demanded by the powers. Greece subsequently gave every assurance in this respect and the German minister at Athens has been instructed to support the efforts of the powers to conclude peace.

A Lawsuit, said to be without precedent for its curious and apparently useless features, is on trial in Dutchess county, N. Y.
