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... Let M. Thiers
and... of this—that there is
more political strength, a truer national defence, in
one ounce of honesty, than in whole quarries of
granite.

This question of fortification will, for some time,
serve to busy the brains of young France; but we
must doubt the erection of the wall. We shrewdly
suspect that M. Thiers will, not only like *Snow* the
tinker, play the part of *Wall*, but will also double it
with that of *Moonshine*.

We learn from Paris that the English government
have united their remonstrances against the
extraordinary armaments of France to keep up that
contradiction, a "paix armée," to those previously
made by Austria and Prussia, and the English gov-
ernment have also signified their intention to in-
crease considerably their navy, if the naval arma-
ments of France should be increased, as England
could only, by these means, make head against the
superiority which France has in her armies.

We are able to contradict the report in the minister-
ial evening journal, that "the Powers had ex-
pressed their approval of the convention between
Commodore Napier and Mehemet Ali;" that con-
vention, as yet, not having been communicated to
them through the official channel, Sir Robert Stop-
ford.—*Morning Herald*.

There appears to be no doubt of the fact that the
Four Powers have united in protesting against the
military preparations now making in France.

The entire of the Royal Artillery are to be fur-
nished with percussion tubes for field pieces, as
more certain and expeditious than the common
tube and port-fire. Lieutenant Slemans, of the
Hanoverian Artillery, is the inventor.

The recruiting for the Royal Artillery goes on
slowly; and the regiment at the end of the year
will be greatly under the establishment.

Captain Reynolds (the black bottle man) three
weeks ago tendered his resignation, and asked leave
to sell out of the service; but no answer has been
received by him.

Prussia.—The *Courrier de la Moselle* of the 17th
announces that a conspiracy had been discovered in
the Prussian States, the object of which was to
place the throne of Prussia in the hands of the elder
brother of *Wau IV.*, now a major in a regiment in
garrison at Metz.

The Queen of England and the Sultan.—The Sul-
tan has, we understand, directed that a splendid
brilliant necklace, to be composed entirely of dia-
monds of the first water, be immediately prepared
as a present to her Majesty Queen Victoria. It is
intended to be a token of his esteem for our be-
loved Sovereign, who has been his highness's best
friend in the hour of need.—*Smyrna Observer*.

Small Pox.—Small pox has continued to spread
in London, and nothing has even yet been done to
arrest its progress. In the week ending November
21, 51 persons died from this disorder, giving an
average of more than seven per diem. The next
week's total was 43, indicating a slight decrease,
which was, unhappily, more than compensated by
the week ending December 5, when 66 persons, or
more than nine daily, died of the same disease.—
The more recent returns have distinguished these
cases in which vaccination had been performed dur-
ing lifetime of the deceased, and from these it ap-
pears that an immense majority, certainly not less
than five-sixths, of the whole number of victims
were never vaccinated at all. This result at once
furnishes the most striking testimony to the value of
vaccination as an antidote, and the most conclusive
evidence of the guilt of the Poor Law Commission-
ers in suffering a law intended to place so power-
ful an antidote within every man's reach to become
ineffective through their perverse economy or in-
excusable neglect.—*Times*.
