THE G. T. P. SCHEME WILL BE DEFEATED.

Tomorrow's contest will decide which political party shall dominate the affairs of Canada for the next five years.

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Beyond a doubt, tomorrow will see the heaviest vote polled in the history of Canada.

The Times has made careful investigations through its correspondents in each province. In every case an impartial estimate was asked for.

In British Columbia which returns seven members that are three cornered fights in four seats, the socialist party having nominated candidates in Kootenay, Nanaimo, Vancouver and Victoria.

In the Northwest territories and the Yukon there are three cornered fights in Saskatchewan and Strathcona. As in other provinces the principal issue will be the G. T. P. question.

In Manitoba the conservatives will sweep the province and it would not be surprising if the whole conservative ticket would be returned.

The maritime provinces have been severely dealt with by the government on the G. T. P. question and the conservatives hope to make considerable gains.
