OFFICER HURT

And a Youth Under Arrest Charged with Resisting the Police.

A lad named George Ryan was brought before the magistrate this morning on a charge of obstructing the sidewalk in front of the York Theatre, also for resisting the police and assaulting Officer Perry in the lawful discharge of his duty. Perry was on duty at the York Theatre last night, and says that a number of boys were loitering about the lower or gallery entrance. He told them repeatedly to move on, and finally succeeded in getting them as far as the sidewalk, and told them that they must not hang around there as they were in the way of passers-by. Ryan told the officer that if he was looking for trouble they would give him all he wanted. They were on a public thoroughfare, and he had no right to touch them. "Do you mean to say that neither you nor the rest of the crowd will go away when I tell you to?" "Certainly we won't."
