BIG HAUL IN TORONTO.

Police Detective Arrests Woman Thief and Recovers Much Money.

Toronto, Dec. 7.—Detective Harrison has made one of the biggest hauls that have been pulled off in the history of the Toronto police department for some years. He recovered nearly \$2000 in stolen cash. When he locked up the Mrs. Catherine McArthur, the officers were certain they had in their tolls the queen of the chateaux thieves.

J. Graham, a roomer at 44 Wilton-avenue, complained to the police last week that \$32 had been stolen from his room. At the time his money disappeared, another roomer, Mrs. McArthur, also left. Detective Harrison was given the case. He traced Mrs. McArthur to 66 Ann-street. He visited the house in the afternoon, but the woman was out. He went back in the evening, she was still out. He waited until 10 o'clock, until she came in.

He followed her to her room, told her he was an officer and wished to search her trunk. She objected strongly and refused to give up her keys. He forced the trunk open. Among her clothes he found a pillow slip chock full of money, including bills of all denominations.

Harrison placed the woman under arrest and took her to No. 2 station. The station looked like a bank that had been struck by a cyclone. The desk was stacked high with bank notes, \$1, \$2, \$5 and 10, a few \$20 notes, but not many. They had all been thrown into the bag without having been counted, or any attempt having been made to assort the different denominations.

It took Sergt. Watson, Detective Harrison and Patrolman Wood nearly three hours to count it. Then they announced the amount to be \$1664.

Detective Harrison and P. C. Kennedy made another visit to the Ann-street house and brought away her trunk and a number of paper boxes, containing expensive hats, furs and other wearing apparel, and a little glazed black bag in which they found another bunch of money tied up in a handkerchief, amounting to \$200 or \$300. When this stuff was brought to the station Mrs. McArthur denied being the owner of the packages of dry goods.

The prisoner claims to be a hard-working woman, and that the amount found in her possession is her savings for years. She mentioned a number of prominent families for whom she claims to have worked. She is about 55 years of age, grey hair, slight, bright eyes and very quick and sharp in her movements. She wore a black dress, fawn coat with a fur collar, brown hat with a small red feather. She took her arrest coolly, but when she found the officers were going to make a second visit to her rooms, she became nervous. The room she occupied was small, cold and cheerless.

The police are inclined to doubt her story, on account of the condition in which the bills were crumpled. They looked as if they had been pulled out of a purse and recklessly jammed into the pillow slip. There were rolls from \$5 up to \$50. The number of loose car tickets also looked suspicious to the police. Besides that they found a dozen different purses and chateaux. The officers are positive that she is one of the chateaux thieves who have been working the department stores.

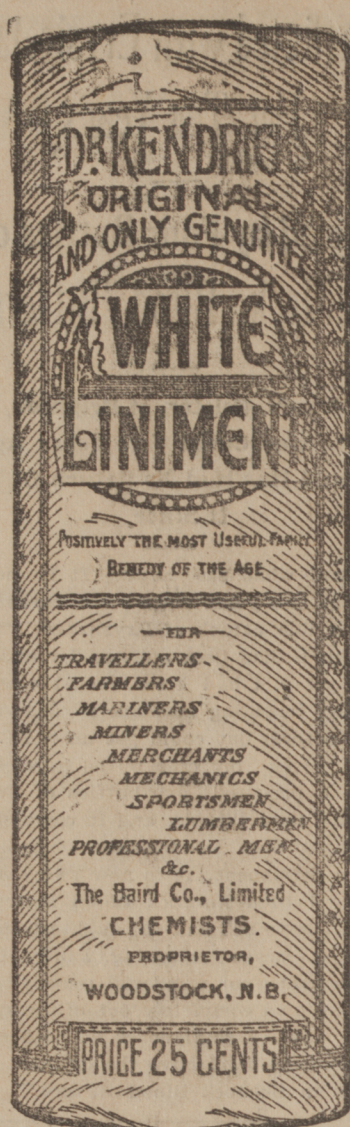

The record keeper of the Knights of the Macabees in sending \$5 from his lodge says: "Our Order has paid lots on lives that would undoubtedly have survived had proper treatment been within reach." W. C. McMaster, Township Clerk, Cookstown, sends \$10 from his municipal council, and says: "We are sure you are doing a noble work to check that dread disease consumption." S. R. Spotteswood, Paris, closes a letter in which he sent \$5 in this way: "Such a work should enlist the sympathy of every true Canadian."

At the present I may be permitted to say that the burden being borne by our trustees is a very heavy one. Expenses always run heavier during the winter season. We have been compelled to build a laundry because other laundries refuse to do our work, and this has called for an immediate expenditure of \$4,000.

But best of all, is the satisfaction that lives are being saved and lengthened by the work at the Muskoka Free Hospital. This is surely plainly indicated in the last report of the Secretary of the Provincial Board of Health, which shows that the death rate in the Province from consumption has been reduced from 3,484 in 1900 to 2,072 in 1903—a reduction of 40 per cent.
