The will requests that Bishop Donahue use the estate to erect and maintain an industrial school for unfortunate poor in memory of the testator styrandfather, Keating Rawson and two orphan asylums in memory of her dead brother, Edward Tracy.

The will bequeaths \$1000 to Bishop McDonald of Brooklyn, \$5000 to John's college for a scholarship and \$1000 to the sisters of St. Francis Xavier church. Bishop Donahue is bequeathed \$1000 together with all the books, paintings, horses and carriages owned by the testatrix for
