

ANNUAL REPORT OF MCGILL UNIVERSITY.

Year 1904-05 Was One of Most Successful in History of the Institution---The Deficit is But \$500---Sir William Macdonald's Benefaction for Student Union Biggest Item of the Year.

(Montreal Gazette.) The annual report of the government, principal, and fellows of McGill University for the year 1903-1904, which is the seventy-fifth year of the teaching work of the university, has just been published, and shows that the past year was marked by advances in every way.

The valuable connections formed by McGill University in the mother land were seen in two Arts graduates, Messrs. J. G. Archibald and H. J. Rose being awarded Rhodes scholarships; and also in the compliment paid to McGill by the Master and Fellows of Christ's College, Cambridge, establishing through the liberality of two friends of education of a Canadian scholarship to be awarded a McGill student.

The most important thing in the history of the session had been the gift to the university by Sir William Macdonald, chairman of the board of governors, of the sum of \$125,000, along with a site on which was to be erected a building to be called the McGill Students' Union.

Among other gifts to the university during the year \$2,000, given by Sir William Macdonald, for purposes of experimental work in the Physics Building; \$250 for experimental psychology, and \$50 annually for philosophical literature all from the same generous donor.
