

GAVE LIQUOR TO INDIAN And Was Fined In Fredericton This Morning. A GOOD MAN GONE.

Death of Martin Lemont Heard With Deep Regret—Rafting Operations Suspended At Douglas Boom—Personal News.

Fredericton, Oct. 10.—(Special).—After an illness extending over a period of thirteen months Martin Lemont, of the firm of Lemont & Sons, furniture dealers, and one of New Brunswick's leading business men, died at his home here at noon today.

Mr. Lemont was a son of the late Martin Lemont and a native of Fredericton. He entered his father's store when twelve years of age and was admitted to a partnership in 1874.

He was a prominent worker in the Methodist church being superintendent of the Sabbath school for eighteen years, and was a recognized leader in all movements pertaining to temperance and moral reform.
