361 434 361 441 **CANADIAN FAILURES.** Statistics of insolvencies for the Do-minion of Canada, according to reports of R. G. Dun & Co., make a much less satistactory exhibit than last year, but compare favorably with two out of four of the years immediately preceding 1903, making on the whole a fair average for the last six years. In number there 1243 the last six years. In number there gated \$8,988,140, which compare with 101 721 last year for \$5,382,611. It must be remembered, however, that 1903 was a phenomenally prosperous year in Can-ada. Manufacturing failures were 225 in number and \$3,043,261 in amount, against 167 for \$2,040,774 in 1903, trading insolvencies numbered 665 and involved \$5,060,986, which compare with 538 failures and \$3,090,072, liabilities a year ago: other failures were unimport-ant in both years, except for a few large banks in 1903. EXPORTATION OF PRUNES.

EAPORTATION OF PROACTS. The exportation of prunes from the United States has grown rapidly in re-cent years, the total number of pounds exported in 1898, the first year in which a record was made by the bureau of statistics, being in round terms 16,000,-000: in 1902, 23,000,000: in 1903, 66,-000,000 and in 1904 will amount to about \$3,500,000. Germany, France, and the United Kingdom are the princi-pal customers for this class of American fruit, the total quantity sent to Ger-many in the fiscal year 1908 being 18,-500,000 pounds; France, 16,000,000 and the United Kingdom, 15,000,000, while Belgium took nearly 5,000,000 pounds; ada about 4,500,000. Of the 66,000,000 pounds of prunes exported in 1903 9,-000,000 went from San Francisco and 53,500,000 from New York, although they are chiefly the product of the Paci-fic coast.


