**Capt. Walls' Funeral** ---  
**Valuable Specimens** ---  
**No Smelt** --- **Successful Fair** --- **C. M. B. A. Officers.**

Chatham, Dec. 14.—The funeral of Captain Dudley Walls, who died Monday, was held to-day and was very largely attended, there being nearly a hundred sleighs in the procession. The service at the home was conducted by Rev. J. Morris MacLean, and St. John's church choir sang "Jesus, Saviour, pilot me," and "Rock of Ages." The deceased was a member of the Orange Lodge here, and the service in St. John's cemetery, where the interment took place, was conducted by D. S. Babjik, Master of the Orange Lodge at Loggieville. The Newcastle Band played the Dead march in Saul and many brother Orangemen from Newcastle, Chatham, and Loggieville, attended.

Mary Dorothy, aged ten months, daughter of William Elkin, died Tuesday after a short illness. The funeral was held to-day the interment being in St. Michael's cemetery.

The Christmas Fair, under the auspices of the Sisters of the Hotel Dieu opened Monday afternoon. There has been a large attendance and up to last night \$765 was taken. The proceeds will be used to help pay the debt on recent hospital improvements.

**Local.**

The trains on both C. P. R. and I. C. P. were delayed yesterday. The C. P. R. Atlantic express due at noon did not arrive until 5.30 o'clock, the delay being caused by a derailed freight car above Megantic. The outgoing No. 10 train was temporarily stopped because of the accident, which also made the Boston express nearly two hours late last night. The Pacific express did not arrive until 8.40 o'clock last night. A hot box on the d'Amboise car was said to be the cause.

The Fredericton city council has decided to enforce market laws. Huckstering will be stopped until after 11 o'clock in the forenoon, and wholesale buyers must keep out of the market until 10 o'clock.

Jas. E. Rockwell, of Hastings, about nine miles from Amherst, N. S., received word yesterday that his

son, W. L. Rockwell, had been drowned at Alaska. The deceased attempted to make the passage from Sand Point to Portage Bay, a distance of about 18 miles, without any companion, and the boat capsized a long distance from the shore.

Capt. Nagle, R. C. R., has been connected with No. 4 depot at Fredericton for seven years, today being the anniversary of his arrival. He has lately issued a book entitled "Aid to Obtaining an Infantry Certificate." The work has been recommended in militia general orders as a "great assistance to officers."

**General.**

The executive council of the Canadian Manufacturers Association at Toronto yesterday afternoon adopted a report of the special committee recommending the association to inaugurate a department of fire insurance.

Jos. Chamberlain at London last night addressed a meeting of the London East Enders. The hall was filled to overflowing and an immense gathering of unemployed outside showed a disposition to create a hostile demonstration. They paraded in front of the building and greeted Mr. Chamberlain on his arrival with groans. This was offset by the reception of the audience in the interior of the building.

At the conclusion of the examination of Mrs. Young, widow of Caesar Young, who was called to the witness stand twice at New York yesterday. Assistant District-Attorney Rand practically rested the case of the prosecution against Nan Patterson, who is on trial in the criminal branch of the supreme court charged with the murder of Young. Mr. Rand announced that he would call only two more witnesses. The decision whether to offer evidence in her defence was postponed until today.

The Toronto city council yesterday adopted a resolution petitioning the Ontario legislature to grant power to the city to expropriate the Toronto Street Railway system, owing to persistent violation of the agreement between the city and railway company.

A Martineau, the defaulting clerk of the militia department, now in the penitentiary, was in the witness box for two hours at Ottawa yesterday afternoon. He swore that he forged the name of J. W. Borden, the accountant of the department, and O. Benjamin Suite, the chief clerk, by placing a carbon sheet between a fac-simile of the signature and the cheque. He did this pencil and afterwards wrote over the pencil marks in ink. He forged two cheques. Altogether he secured over \$75,000.
