NEW YORK'S STRUGGLE.

To Prevent the Loss of Trade to Baltimore, Boston and Other ports.

The Inter-State Commerce Commission this week resumed hearings in Philadelphia in the freight differential rate case.

For some years the grain shippers in Philadelphia and Baltimore were allowed a differential over New York. Early this year the New York lines objected to this differential, and reduced the rate to that quoted by the railroads entering Philadelphia and Baltimore...

Chairman Knapp of the commission announced that there was still some testimony to be taken in this case. Mr. Chamberlain was called to the stand. His testimony was in general to the effect that the differential deflected business to the points where it exists.

Asked his opinion regarding the future result of the abolishment of the differential, Chamberlain said the result would be to retain the Baltimore basis or something lower.
