Bennett, liberal-conservative candidate. Mr. Bennett opened the meeting himself with an excellent speech, in which he exposed the weaknesses of the Grand Trunk Pacific bargain. For an hour and a half Mr. Foster held the attention of the meeting while he made a masterly arraignment of the record and pretensions of the Laurier administration, and set forth the principles upon which the conservatives are appealing to the electors. He was particularly strong in supporting Mr. Borden's policy of non-partisan management of the Intercolonial railway, and in showing the advantage a transcontinental line owned and operated by the state, would be in securing for the manufacturers of the east and farmers of the west reasonable freight, not only on the government line, but also on all competing railways. Mr. Foster's clear and business-like address made a great impression.
