

U. S. WILL BE FIRST. Uncle Sam Confidently Expects to Lead all Nations

ON THE PACIFIC. It Has a Larger and Better Coastline Than Any Other Country and Owns Many Primary Naval Bases—An Interesting Study.

There is much ingenious speculation in Europe concerning the future mastery of the Pacific ocean. The London Spectator thinks that if Japan should organize Chinese resources she would unquestionably become the dominating power of the North Pacific. Others say that if Russia should win this war that position would be hers.

It is curious that these able thinkers cannot perceive the obvious fact that the question they are discussing is not a question at all. The predominance of the Pacific not only will be, but is, the United States. The United States is the only country that has a primary naval base on the Pacific.

The United States has a longer and better coastline on the Pacific than any other country in the world. Russia would gladly exchange her entire coast on the Pacific for a single harbor like the Bay of San Francisco or Puget Sound.

We hold part of the Pacific coast near the equator and own the whole eastern shore of the ocean, from the Mexican line to the Arctic, with a single little break in British Columbia. The Philippines we have an outpost more extensive than the entire Kingdom.

OUTSIDER ON CANADA. Haines of New York Bubbles Over With Wordy Enthusiasm.

The Hon. Charles D. Haines of New York, a former member of the United States Congress, is at the King Edward. Mr Haines has built up and owned some two score street and short line railways and is interested in numerous other enterprises in the States.

"My impression of Canada, in part or as an entirety, both as to country and people," said Mr. Haines to a representative of The Globe, "can but be inadequately expressed by using the word great.

"I am fascinated with the country as it is to-day and am astonished when I study the possibilities of its future. It must be conceded that the great majority of people, both of Great Britain and the United States, have looked upon Canada as a dreary, cold, barren country, and the inhabitants of the provinces have been unfortunately unable to fully extirpate such impressions, and while these delusions to a large extent still exist, they are rapidly passing away, just as rapidly as Canada is making itself really known and understood to and by all the civilized world, as for all practical purposes, it is an independent entity with its future growth and development, social and financial, that will not be eclipsed by any other people.

"The truth of such an apparently visionary and bold statement may be questioned by the thoughtless, or by those who know nothing of Canada other than from observation of the country, while passing through a portion of it on a railroad train, or from the daily press; yet how strangely different are the more recent views and opinions of the business men and manufacturers of the New England States, who now propose to appeal to the United States Congress to favor a reciprocity treaty with Canada.

"As I study Canada more closely and become accustomed to the extent of its vast territory and learn of its wonderful and diversified natural resources, I can but wonder why it is that its population is not why it is that with such a foundation, a corner-stone has been laid of such indestructible material, as neither time nor space can destroy.

"And such a country is to-day peopled with a live, intelligent, progressive class of citizenship, whose business men are noted for their pluck, sterling qualities, restless energy and nervous activity.
