FABULOUS PRICES

Paid in England for New Varieties of Potatoes. (Lander Leader.) Today at the Crystal Palace is the last day of what Mr. W. P. Wright, the secretary of the National Potato Society, called "the largest and finest show of potatoes ever got together in this or any other country."

"The chrysanthemum and tulip fads passed away," said a prominent potato grower yesterday to a "Leader" representative, "but the fabulous 'spud' has come to stay, because it's got a solid bottom to it." A member of the Potato Society and an expert turned a potato field into wonderland while the "Leader" representative waited. "I sold a single potato of this variety, the Eldorado, weighing just over an ounce, for £12 last March. This morning the purchaser tells me he has lifted, as its produce, 4 cwt. 3st.; that was at Hagynby Priory, Lincolnshire."

THIS IS NEW.
