TUBE AND PIPE PRICES.

Pittsburg, Oct. 20.—The National Tube Co., has issued a new base card on all sizes and makes of tubes and pipes. A general advance of \$2 per ton is made. It is only six week ago that the tubes and pipes were reduced \$4 per ton. Two days later billets were reduced to \$19.25 per ton. per ton.

The significance of the advance in price will be great, as it indicates that steel rails will not be reduced in price next month when the rail pool meets to fix the price for 1905.

ONTARIO'S POTATO CROP.

It is now definitely established that the Ontario potato crop suffers considerably from rot. This is particularly evident in localities where the potatoes have been grown on low lying land. While in some instances, the receipts are of fairly good quality, the arrival of rotted stocks are so frequent as to throw suspicion on all Ontario potatoes coming forward, and dealers at this market are loathe to handle them. In many cases they look well upon arrival, but a short time in the cellars serves to show their unreliability. Stocks from the Maritime provinces are generally sound and they are sold upon a considerable premium over the product of this province.—Bradstreets.

SOO TRAFFIC.

No doubt western growth is largely responsible for the increase in the traffic through the Soo canals, reported for last month. This point is the mouth of the funnel through which is poured the products of the west, and it acts the same way for eastern manufacturers, shipments of which are steadily growing. Compared with September, 1903, the figures for that month, 1904, show an increase in vessels using the canals of 268 with a total tonnage of 767,819. There is an increase in freight amounting to 981,007 tons. The total freight carried during the month was 5,246,657 tons, of which 4,139,813 was eastbound and 1,106,826 was westbound.—Bradstreets.
