

THE U. S. GOVERNMENT WILL INVITE CANADA

To Consider the Question of Reciprocity ---That was the Statement Made by Attorney General Moody in Boston Today.

Boston, Oct. 7.—Addressing the Massachusetts republican delegates today—Attorney General Moody said— "There has been much discussion within our own party upon the question of reciprocity with Canada and a lack of universal agreement whether it is desirable or possible and if desirable and possible what should be the scope and character of the agreement between the two countries. Our trade relations with Canada should be influenced by political considerations. It is of the highest importance to this country and to the world that the two English speaking nations should forever remain at peace and for that reason it is important that our relations with England's great dependency to the northward should continue harmonious. I think I may safely assure you that in the near future this government will again invite Canada to consider in a friendly spirit our

trade relations. It is not for me to speak in detail of the concessions which each can properly make to the other. Such considerations arise only at a later stage of the proceedings. We should look with suspicion upon the advice of any whose private and special interests cause them to prefer Canadian interests to American interests. We should seek for a real reciprocity and not a sham reciprocity, a reciprocity in which we receive as well as give. Mindful of our own interest and of our own self respect, let us in any negotiations which may be opened, be inspired by a feeling of friendship and a desire to extend our trade relations in a manner that shall be mutually profitable. If a treaty should fail of negotiation or ratification, let me commend to your consideration the statesmanlike suggestion made by the junior senator (Lodge) that reciprocity may be satisfactorily obtained by a system of maximum and minimum duties."

A DREADFUL RECORD OF DISASTERS.

On United States Railways Last Year 9,984 Persons Were Killed and 78,152 Injured—The English Roads Much Safer.

New York, Oct. 7.—A despatch to the World from Washington says: Official details prepared by the interstate commerce commission shows that in the last year 9,984 persons were killed in railroad wrecks and 78,247 injured. An officer of the commission stated that the increase of fatalities annually is regularly growing with the extension of the railroad and population. We have received reports from England which are as remarkable as the killings here. Approximately the English average is less than 50,000 miles of track to our 200,000 yet they do greater per mile business than we do. They haul more passengers than we do, yet there was

not one passenger killed last year. The records of the commission show that in the last ten years 78,152 persons have lost their lives in railroad accidents; These deaths are distributed yearly as follows: 1895.....6,136 1896.....5,845 1897.....6,437 1898.....6,859 1899.....8,123 1900.....7,865 1901.....8,445 1902.....8,558 1903.....9,840 1904.....9,884 A comparatively small proportion of the killed and injured referred to in the bulletin was of the passenger class.

THE PARTIES LINE UP IN MASSACHUSETTS.

Republicans and Democrats Meet in Convention and Nominate State Tickets and Federal Electors.

Boston, Oct. 7.—With the gathering of Massachusetts Republican delegates in Tremont Temple to-day in convention to nominate a state ticket and presidential electors, the only contest, that for nomination of state treasurer, narrowed down to John C. Whipple of Brockton and Mayor Chapin of Holyoke. Inability to reach an agreement on the Canadian reciprocity plank made another meeting of the resolutions' committee necessary before the convention to-day. There was some expectation that the conservative wing would consent to the insertion of a modified reciprocity declaration rather than have the issue presented to the convention. U. S. Attorney General Wm. H. Moody had been selected as permanent chairman of the state ticket, save for the office of treasurer was Governor—John L. Bates. Lieutenant Governor—Curtis Guild Jr. Secretary of state—Wm. M. Olin. Auditor—Henry A. Turner.

Attorney general—Herbert Parker. Boston, Oct. 7.—The Democratic state convention was held today to nominate a state ticket and presidential electors, adopt a platform and elect the members at large of the Democratic state committee. Only upon this last issue was any contest expected. Before the convention there were indications that the radical wing of the party which had urged the incorporation of certain of its principles in the resolutions had not been entirely pacified. It was not expected, however, that a controversy would develop the platform. The leaders were agreed upon the following ticket:—Wm. L. Douglas, of Brockton for Governor, John C. Crosby, of Pittsfield, for Lieutenant Governor, Henry T. Schaeffer, of Winchester, for secretary of state, Edmund C. Codman, of Boston, for treasurer, John V. Leahy of Boston, for attorney general Francis Tetrault, of Southbridge, for state editor.

CAPITAL AND LABOR Will Get Together in Toronto to Consider the Adjustment of Labor Troubles.

Montreal, Oct. 7.—(Special)—Arrangements have been made to hold a conference between the Canadian Manufacturers' Association and the Trades and Labor Congress in Toronto, the end of the present month. This conference was arranged for when the two bodies were sitting in Montreal last month, and its object is to reach some basis for the adjustment of labor troubles. The Montreal executive of the Manufacturers' Association have selected J. J. McGill, Hon. J. D. Rolland and J. T. Hagar as its representatives.

FREDERICTON Y. M. C. A HAD MOST SUCCESSFUL YEAR.

Annual Reports Show That Institution to be in a Flourishing Condition—Martin Lemont Dying—Personal News.

Fredericton, N. B., Oct. 7.—(Special)—The annual meeting of the Y. M. C. A. was held here last evening and the reports submitted showed the organization to be in a healthy condition. The ordinary receipts for the year were \$954.74 and the disbursements \$935.26. The mortgage indebtedness of \$10,000 on the building was reduced to \$4100 during the year, over \$5,000 being raised in subscriptions. The condition of Martin Lemont & Sons is very critical to-day.
