

FOUR NEW WORLD'S RECORDS MADE IN ONE DAY'S RACING.

Transylvania Stake Races Furnished Wonderful Sport—Local Football Tomorrow—How Miss Thomson is Regarded—No Post Season Baseball—News of the Turf and Ring.

Four World's Records Made.

Lexington, Ky., Oct. 7.—The Transylvania for 2.12 trotters, value \$5,000 yesterday resulted in possibly the greatest contest in the history of the trotting turf, and was won by Sweet Marie in the three final heats, the first two heats going to Tiverton. Four world's records were made in the Transylvania today, besides lowering the event record and making the fastest mile of the year on any track. When Tiverton won the first heat in 2.05½ he made fastest trotting record of any horse this year. When he won the second heat in 2.04½ he again lowered these records and made the world's record for the fastest second heat trotted in a race.

Sweet Marie won the third heat in 2.05. This established a world's record for the three fastest heats ever trotted in a race. Sweet Marie won the fourth heat in 2.08½, and the fifth heat in 2.09, thus establishing a world's record for the five fastest heats ever trotted in a race. The average time for each heat was 2.06 and eleven twentieths. The first three heats averaged 2.05½.

How They Regard Miss Thomson.

The Toronto News of Wednesday says:

Though not at all old in years, Miss Thomson, of St. John (N. B.), is a veteran in the game. She was one of the earliest converts the game had in the dominion. She has brought honor to her club on more than one occasion; and there are not a few golfers who look upon her as the winner of this year's contest. She is a splendid long driver and deadly in a short game as well. The quality of steadiness is also hers; a necessary attribute to a winner of the championship.

When Miss Thomson returned her card she did not know what a good score she had made.

Miss Thomson made the sixth hole in 2 yesterday. That is one better than bogey.

New York Oct. 6.—There will be no post-season series of games played this year between the New York teams of the National and American baseball leagues. President John T. Brush of the New York National League Club, when seen tonight said that after an absence of six days from his office, through illness, he found on his desk today the challenge for a world's championship series sent to him by President Gordon of the Greater New York team of the American league some days ago. Mr. Brush referred to John J. McGraw for a statement and Manager McGraw was very emphatic in his refusal to play a post-season series.

Fighters' Millions.

Where are the millions that fighters have won in purses and side bets? Tom Sharkey can account for some small part of the roll; but Tom is only one man. Others have made fortunes in the ring as well as the sailor.

John L. Sullivan was the king of money getters and the king of spend-thrifts. During his fighting period the old champion made more than \$1,000,000, and today he is out in St. Louis for a monthly salary that he would have thrown away in a hour years ago.

Sullivan gave his money away, and when he could not give it away fast enough he threw it on the street for any passerby to pick it up. Even Rockefeller could beggar himself if he had the spirit of old John L.

Young Corbett has a little knowledge of the value of money as John L. himself. Shortly after the Corbett Hanlon fight, in San Francisco, the little Denverite went out to the race track. He had just \$1200 left, for bookmakers had been trimming him merrily.

Do Fighters Hypnotize?

Some scientist has given it as his opinion that James J. Jeffries wins his battles through "autohypnotism." "Although it seems somewhat unnecessary for a man of Jeffries' gigantic physical power, boxing cleverness and real fighting ability to call mesmerism to his aid I believe that it is exactly what Jeffries does," adds Robert Edgren.

"Jeffries himself is ignorant of the fact that he does it. But Jeffries is not the only fighter who uses hypnotic power in the ring. Bob Fitzsimmons owes much of his success to the same thing.

"One of the best instances of this that I have ever seen was in the match between Fitzsimmons and Con Coughlin in Philadelphia a year ago. "Coughlin was a big, strong fellow, with courage enough under ordinary circumstances, but of a nervous temperament.

"The day before the fight I was talking with Fitzsimmons at his quarters. 'I never saw this fellow,' said Fitz, 'but he is green in the ring. Just watch him when I get my eye on him, and you'll see the fight ooze right out of him.'

"When Fitzsimmons got into the ring that next night, after letting the big Irishman wait a long time, he walked to the opposite corner, stood straight up and stared at Coughlin. His eyes were drawn to a blue point. Coughlin looked back without blinking. When the men were called to the centre of the ring, Fitz, standing close, still stared steadily into Coughlin's eyes. By that time the big fellow seemed in a state of nervous collapse. His arms dangled at his side, and when the bell rang he was helpless to defend himself.

In the Mojave desert I have seen a jackrabbit, confronted at close range by a rattlesnake stand in that same paralyzed way, staring and seeming unable to move out of range.

Young Corbett had the same strange power over most of the little fellows that he met in the ring. Even those who nearly matched him in strength and skill came to the scratch with muscles that were unnerved. Corbett always sits in his corner and stares across the ring at his opponent before the fight, just as Fitzsimmons does. He did that when he fought McGovern the first time, and he did it again in California. Terry never could fight against Young Corbett with the coolness and

skill that he exercised against other men in his class.

When Jeffries fought Gus Ruhlin in California he took the Akronite's nerve away from him so completely that Gus forgot all of his fighting craft and was unable to put a fraction of his strength into the blows he struck. His eyes popped from his head, and he looked like a man in a trance. Gus went through the motions of fighting, but his muscles were flabby and powerless as a paralytic's.

Munroe was even more affected by Jeff's glare than Ruhlin. The giant sat in his corner staring across the ring, at his rival. Munroe had come to the ringside prepared to fight, to take a beating if he must, but to fight to the end. Five minutes after climbing through the ropes he stepped up to face Jeffries, his eye-starting, moving spasmodically, like the rabbit approaches the rattlesnake.

It isn't fear that paralyzes a fighting man's nerve and makes him fall an easy victim to a man he could fight on even terms. No boxer fears a blow, because every boxer knows that a blow doesn't hurt to any extent. Just as hard blows are given and taken in daily training as in the actual fight.

It may take a better hypnotist to beat Jeff after all, instead of a bigger man.

LONDON TO HEAR MUEZZIN'S CRY.

Mohometan Mosque to be Erected in Christendom's Greatest City.

London, Oct. 6.—The more than two thousand Mahometans in this city are soon to have a splendid mosque in which to worship.

For years past Mahometans missionaries have been trying to spread a knowledge of Islamic teachings, but their efforts have been handicapped for want of a central mosque. Robert Williams, the well known architect, has received a commission from a Turkish pasha to prepare the plans, and these have been despatched to Constantinople for the approval of a committee of pashas. Ultimately they will be submitted to the Sultan.

"The mosque," explained the architect, "is intended for Mahometans in London—Indian, Egyptian, Afghan, and Persian, as well as Turkish, for King Edward VII. It must be remembered, rules over more Mahometan subjects than any other sovereign. The mosque will be an imposing structure in red and yellow stone. The decorative work will be carried out in marble and jasper, and a broad flight of steps in marble, granite and jasper will lead to the great central entrance.

A grateful minaret surrounded by galleries whence the muezzin will call the faithful in London to worship, is a notable feature of the design. The minaret is surrounded by a cupola, and the golden crescent will be 200 feet from the ground."

CITY HIGH AND DRY IN TEXAS.

River Changed its Course and Town is Now Inland.

Austin, Tex., Oct. 6.—James Morgan, who arrived from the Rio Grande region, confirms the report that the river has changed its course and that a greater bulk of water is flowing down the bed of the old arroyo Colorado than is in the old bed of the river, which runs by Brownsville. He says that the Texas territory, which is now situated below the main channel of the river, aggregates fully 600,000 acres.

The arroyo Colorado channel is being constantly deepened by the flow of the river, and it is now said to be considerably below the level of the old channel. The distance between the mouth of the new channel and the mouth of the old channel is twenty-five miles. The city of Brownsville, with a population of 10,000, and the terminus of the new railroad built by the Yoakum syndicate, will be left high and dry if the arroyo Colorado channel becomes the permanent waterway of the river.
