Every candidate is allowed by law to have one head election agent, one sub-election agent in every election district, one sub-agent or watcher at the polls and one clerk and one messenger at every polling-place. None of these men may vote for him. The candidate and his head agent must both make sworn statements giving the names of all his employees and instant attention by their peculiarities or by showiness, and to cause the ignorant and the lowbred to say, what fine manners, are very likely ill-mannered and underbred persons who would annoy persons of good taste very much. The basis of good manners is good nature, a spirit of deference, reasonableness, regard for others, the tone and temper which distinguish very highly civilized tenfold.

During the next twenty years Parliament passed frequent acts against bribery, but the remedy then seems to have been more to punish the borough whose voters allowed themselves to be bribed than to punish the man who did the bribing.

Grampound was thus disfranchised in 1820, Retford in 1826, Penrhyn in 1828, Liverpool in 1834. Carrickfergus in 1833, Stafford in 1836 and Sudhury in 1642.
