Horse Trading.

There has been quite something doing the past day or two in horse trades. As the result of some dickering Harvey McCoy has secured Province Belle, the speediest brush pacer seen here for a long time, from Spencer H. Sterling. In exchange he gave the handsome Mack F. black trotting mare that he recently got from George Glasier.

Province Belle is a standard bred and registered brown mare foaled in 1892 by Lumps, 3922; dam Ray Gould, 2.294 by Jay Gould, 197; granddam Emeline (dam of Adele Gould, 2.19). She was bred by W. F. Todd and some months ago purchased by J. C. Allen from Woodstock parties. Mr. Allen disposed of her to Mr. Sterling, who is going to impart another fast one. Mr. Miller of Campbellton, is in the city today and is thinking of purchasing Province Belle, but Harvey is not anxious to let her go as he feels that with proper training she would go a fusa mile.—(Fredericton Gleaner, Jan. 12.)

Canada's Best Harness Horse.

The Dominion of Canada had the honor of giving to the grand circuit this season one of its brightest pacer stars says the Winnipeg Free Press. The bay gelding Gallagher, by Royal Rydyk, 2.18, dam by Crescent, bred by Mr. E. B. Tole, of Blenheim, Ont., owned by McMillen & Matheson, of High River, Alberta, N. W. T., and driven by the Canadian reinsman, Havers James, followed the grand circuit from Detroit to Memphis and raced in a manner that stamped him as the peer of even the sensational John M., 2.02. The victory was purely Canadian, and throughout the great Dominion Gallagher's name is as familiar as that of Dan Patch or Lou Dillon, for he is by the records the fastest harness horse ever bred there.

BILLIARDS.

Change in Rules.

After many years the rules governing billiards are undergoing the most rigid revision. The most systematic effort is being made to arrive at a standard which will be recognized alike by all amateurs and professionals, and thus do away with

took time to see Gallagher in many of his races, and last fall they took back home with them a goodly sum won by his victories.

In 1902 Gallagher made a modest debut, winning his one race and taking a record of 2.24 1-4. In 1903 he fell into Havers James' hands and soon it was demonstrated that James was necessary to the gelding's success. He raced constantly all season, but the real lapping of his extreme class was demonstrated when at Nashua, N. H., on Nov. 20 the weather being cold and raw, and the half mile track not at its best, he met Frank Youkam, 2.05, Louise G., 2.03. The Bishop, 2.06, and Major C. 2.04, and beat them conclusively in a terrific four-beat race. It was a notable victory under the conditions in 2.10, 2.09, 2.10, 2.10, placed him at once in the limelight. He was regarded by critics as the best prospect for the 2.08 stakes notwithstanding the fact that John M. and other eligibles had paced trials much faster, and he made good despite a sick spell which attacked him the latter end of the season. In the list of money winning pacers he stands third on the grand circuit roster.

His campaign began at Stratford, Ont., July 2, where he won the free-for-all, taking the last three heats over a heavy half-mile track. At the opening grand circuit meeting at Detroit he finished 2-3 to John M., in 2.07, 2.06. In the \$5,000 Empire State 2.09 pace at Buffalo, the next week, he met twenty of the most formidable pacers that ever started in an event of the class. The field included Morning Star, 2.04, John M. 2.02, King Direct, 2.05, and others of note. From all parts of Canada Gallagher admirers came to witness the race. He was third choice in the betting, and after the third heat, in which he finished seventh he sold for a song. The Dominion boys were down to a man, and when Gallagher floated home after winning the second and third heats—and races—in 2.04, 2.04, Canada was heard from. As one turf writer puts it, "Their salves precluded the necessity of wiring the news to their distant homes." At the Empire City meeting, the next week, he won the \$5,000 Bronz stake for 2.08 pacers, defeating again John M. and eight others. The time was 2.03, 2.04. His first heat in the record for a Canadian bred harness horse, displacing that of Harold H., 2.04.

For the \$5,000 Brighton stake at Brighton Beach, he raced two terrific heats head and head with Pan Michael, 2.05 being beaten in the first, but winning the second in 2.05, John M., who had been taking matters leisurely up to this time, now came on fresh and won, but after a stern struggle with the Canadian John M. also defeated him in the Park Brew \$5,000 stake at Providence, but Gallagher won the first heat in 2.04, and was second in each of the others. The race was a cut and slash affair, with honors nearly even. In the 2.02 pace at Hartford the Canadian won in straight heats—both in 2.05—beating Major C., 2.04 and Dan R., 2.01. At the Breeders meeting in Readville he was beaten by Nathan Straus in slow time. Before Columbus was reached the gelding developed a fever which

interfered materially with his campaign thereafter. Nathan Straus again beat him at Columbus, but the following week at Cincinnati he turned the tables, on all his rivals, beating John M., Straus, Locanda, 2.03, and Dan R., 2.01, in 2.04, in 2.04, 2.04. At Memphis he was beaten twice by John M., being at the time in a weakened condition. Gallagher retired to winter quarters in the stable of Havers James, sound and, in the opinion of critics, will be in 1905 a most likely candidate for 2.00 honors. Havers James, who may win with him, is one of the most capable reinsmen of the younger school. He has made many good horses with limited material to work on. In the spring he will conduct a public stable at Hamilton, Ont., and later race his best pupils on the grand circuit.
