

RATES MUST BE REASONABLE.

The Long Looked For Bill to Curb the Railway Corporations.

Washington, Jan. 23.—Representative Hepburn on Saturday introduced his bill amending the interstate commerce act, which has been under consideration some time and which had been submitted to the President and Attorney General and other members of the Administration.

The President is authorized to appoint an assistant attorney general for the enforcement of the act.

The Interstate Commerce Commission is authorized during a judicial review of its order to modify or suspend the order under review.

An appeal from the Court of Commerce can only be taken to the Supreme Court of the United States.

The present Interstate Commerce Commission is abolished, and a new commission created, composed of seven members, at \$7000 a year.

A court of commerce composed of five circuit judges of the United States in created, which shall hold four regular sessions each year, in Washington.

The bill consists of twenty-one sections, much attention being given to the details and methods of procedure under which the commission and the court of commerce shall proceed.

SCHOOLBOY SOLDIERS.

Famous Physician Advocates Shooting For Boys.

The teaching of military exercises in schools was strongly advocated by Sir Laurier Brunton, the well-known physician, in an address to the conference of Federated Head Teachers' Associations at Cambridge, England, last week.

"We ought to be able to defend our shores against any invader," he said, "The Boyer showed what can be done in the way of fighting by boys of 14, who have been accustomed to handle a rifle all their lives, and there seems no reason why English boys should not be quite as able to fight in case of need."

Little boys, he continued, should be taught to drill with sticks, and as they grow older they should learn to shoot at miniature rifles ranges, which should be attached to their schools.

The boys should be encouraged to become proficient in marksmanship. Inter-scholastic competitions might be arranged, and once or twice a year all the scholars in a district might have regular manoeuvres.

Physical exercises of this character would involve the wear of muscle, and Sir Laurier expressed the opinion that provision should be made for the feeding of the poorer children, although he thought the parents should as far as possible be made to defray the cost.

BEEF FEEDING; CLOVER CROP.

Agricultural Department Deals With Both in Bulletins--- How to Feed For Profit.

Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, Jan. 19.—Before you begin to feed, select the best possible animals, said Prof. J. H. Grisdale of the Central Experimental Farm, at the Maritime Winter Fair.

First, look at the steer's face—we want a broad face, not too long with a mild large eye—a large muzzle.

All good feeding steers have short thick necks. We want a steer with a good constitution, for he must digest large quantities of food to make a rapid growth.

The development of the hind quarters should also show length and depth and width—a straight and not a rounding hump.

The thick, low set steer will flesh much more cheaply than the rangy steer.

There is something in the young animal that enables it to make better use of its food than when it gets older.

We find it pays to put feeding animals in a loose box—of course they must be of fairly uniform size—8 or 9 in a box is enough.

When putting up steers in the fall, feed lots of succulent food, and all the roughage you can economically get them to eat.

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The clover crop.

It is difficult in any year to make a close estimate of the supply of Alsike and Red Clover seed until the season for threshing is well advanced.

The Alsike crop fared even worse than the Red Clover. Not only is the available supply of home-grown seed limited, but the quality of the seed produced this year is, on the whole, inferior.

The growing of high-class clover seed in the Province of Ontario has proved to be amply remunerative in the average of years, and has to a considerable extent, taken the place of the production for sale of cereal grains.

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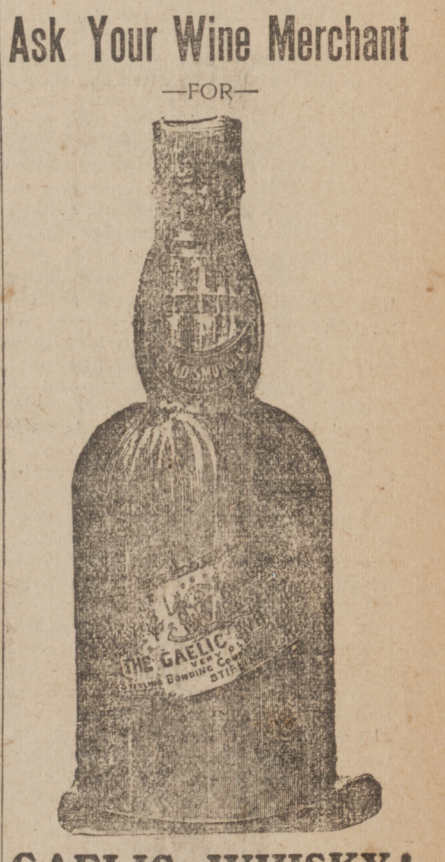
