In the second half the puck went into Ramblers' territory and soon Kennedy made the first goal for the gold diggers. Play then got very swift, and at the end of eight minutes Murray scored the second goal for the Ramblers.

New York, Jan. 24.—The Tribune says tennis players will cross the ocean in an endeavor to recapture the Dwight F. Davis International Challenge Cup from the Englishmen this season. That this was the American attitude was learned yesterday on the receipt of letters in this city from the committee of the United States National Lawn Tennis Assn. of Boston to Holcombe Ward, W. A. Larned, Malcolm D. Whitman and Raymond D. Little asking if it was possible for them to make the trip and play on the American team. Similar letters were sent to W. J. Clothier of Philadelphia, Kreigh Collins of Chicago and Beals C. Wright of Boston. The formal challenges is not called for until March 1 and action will not be taken until the annual meeting of the association in this city early next month. The replies of the men named will not be made public until that meeting although it can be said now that Whitman will not give his time to make the journey.

## NO SUNDAY BASEBALL.

### Opponents of the Game Win Important Legal Victory IN JERSEY CITY.

### Eastern League Ball Team Owners Heavily Fined For Changing Affidavits—Wanted to Prove Sunday Ball Was Not a Nuisance.

New York, Jan. 24.—Fines aggregating \$2,260 were imposed by Chancellor Magie, of the New Jersey court of chancery in Jersey City yesterday in the case of Howard C. Griffiths, a lawyer; Captain Benjamin T. Haegenson, Wm. J. Davis and August Seastream, defendants in the contempt proceedings arising from contradictory affidavits submitted to the court of chancery last spring in proceedings brought to enjoin the New Jersey Exhibition Company owners of the Jersey City Eastern League Base Ball Club from having Sunday games at Bayonne says the Herald.

Griffiths, who is president and counsel of the baseball company, was fined \$1,000 and costs, Captain Haegenson a pilot on the Pennsylvania Railroad, ferries, suffered a like penalty.

Davis, who is the son of Robt. Davis, Democratic leader in Hudson County, was fined \$250 with costs. Seastream was fined \$10.

When the injunction proceedings were brought by persons living in the neighborhood of the Bayonne baseball grounds, Seastream made an affidavit declaring Sunday games a nuisance. Later, counsel for the baseball company, filed another affidavit in which Seastream explained that he favored Sunday baseball and had signed the first affidavit under a misapprehension of the facts. Vice Chancellor Pitney, before whom the injunction proceedings were tried, ordered an investigation. Seastream made a statement on which the subsequent contempt proceedings were based. He said he made the second affidavit in the office of a former city collector in the presence of Griffiths, Haegenson and Davis. Seastream then swore that the original affidavit was the correct one. The matter was referred to Chancellor Magie.
