The death of the late Mr. Keans makes vacancy in the representation of the city of St. John. It is to be hoped that the people of that city will awake from the apathy, so far as provincial politics are concerned, into which they appear to have fallen, and return to the Assembly a representative who will be Mr. King. Of the late representative as a politician, we have nothing to say: he was a hard worker and a man of good motives; but in regard to the others it will be pretty generally admitted that the country would not suffer if they remained at home and sent their proxies to the Assembly in charge of the Attorney General. A man who will speak out promptly and earnestly on behalf of the public interests; who can see far enough into the future to recognize that independence affords the surest path to political success; who is not above dealing with facts and figures and who does not mind performing in the interests of the Province what may be perhaps a disagreeable duty, will find a fine field for labor in the Assembly. It is true that no great issue divides public opinion : but then the day of great issues in local politics is about over and it is with such ordinary and, perhaps viewed from the standpoint of certain would-be statesmen, vulgar matters as the relation which should subsist between receipts and expenditures, the want of integrity in the administration of certain public departments, and the disastrous effects which have followed a time serving policy on the part of the Government, that the new member, whoever he may be, will have to deal.
