At the Brooklyn Theatre, last night, while a large audience were witnessing the "Two Orphans," the theatre took fire and burned to the ground. Loss \$125,000.

Burning of Brooklyn Theatre last night bursday, 1st February. turns out an appaling disaster. Latest reports state that one hundred and seventy-five lives were lost, including H. S. Murdoch, the well known actor. Sixty-six dead bodies have been recovered. The fire, which broke out at a quarter past eleven, originated in the flies, which fell blazing on the top of the scenery. One of the actresses came to the front of the stage and said, "a small accident has occurred; don't be alarmed-only a piece of the fly on fire." Immediately the audi ence, which was a large one, rushed for th entrances, and the panic became general. In two minutes the stage was one mass of flame. The heat was intense. Many who occupied seats near the stage felt scorching heat and sank helpless to the floor. Men plunged in mad terror over seats, and fought their way of the "Peabody Medical Institute," in this to the door like wild beasts. The aisles were blocked, and the fire danced and hissed through the combustible machinery, and darted over the heads of the orchestra. De moralization became complete.
