Potatoes an Exhausting Crop.

Grain crops remove a comparatively small quantity of ma. nurial constituents. These facts show the reason why, while wheat can be grown successfully year after year on Messrs. Kelly and McQueen, or they have suitable soil, without the return of any of the ash constituents, the same cannot be done with either potatoes or fied that so long as there is a dollar to expend turnips. While potatoes and turnips in public works no considerations of morality contain much nitrogen, a nitrogenous manure is scarcely required for their growth if the soil is in good condition. The fact that green crops are so far independent of nitrogenous matter in the soil is no doubt due to their having broad leaves to take the ammonia will find it very difficult to solve. from the air, and keep spreading roots to gather what they require through a greater mass of soil. The same remark applies to the luguminons crops -beans, peas, vetches, clover, etc. During the growth of clover, for instance, nitrogen even accumulates in the soil. So, although luguminous crops contain much nitrogen, nitrogenous light manures are found in practice, not to be required. On the other hand, an application of phosphoric acid, sulphuric acid and lime, which can cheaply be applied as a mineral superphosphate, generally produces a most marked effect .-North British Agriculturist.
