It does not give a very correct idea of the debate and it particularly does not do justice to the speech of the Attorney General. We propose to give the points which that Honorable gentleman did make with a few running comments.

It must be borne in mind that what the Opposition sought to establish was that the Government ought not to have asked the House to bring the Consolidation into operation the first that time. Mr. King's first excuse was that the Government intended to delay the time for the Consolidation to come into force until the first of November: but it being necessary, for political reasons, that the Municipalities Act should come into operation on the first of May, it was determined not to delay the coming in force of the Consolidation, as the whole body of the Statute law was affected by the Act in question. 


