The Roumanian army is concentrating, and as yet it is unknown what part, if any, it will take in the war. This principality, of which so much will be said in the next few weeks, is one of the three protectorates of Turkey. It comprises the Provinces of Wallachia and Moldavia, has an area of a little over 40,000 equare miles and a population of about four and a half millions. It extends from the Northern bank of the Danube to the Carpathian Mountains on the one side and the river Pruth on the other. Its present ruler is Prince Charles of Hohenzollern-Sinaringen, who ascended the throne in 1866. Roumania pays an annual tribute to the Porte of about \$100,000, and its Prince receives his investiture from the Sultan, but in other respects find excellent pasturage. The climate is ly. In the 11th century Roumania fell into the hands of the Turks; in the 13th century the Niargols overran it. In the 13th and 14th centuries the original inhabitants re-asserted their rights and that successfully, and in the beginning of the fifteenth century placed themselves under the protection of the Porte. In 1802 Russia contented with Turkey for the protectorate and for a time obtained it, but i has since passed out of her hands.
