GOVERNMENT HOUSE OTTAWA Monday, 8th day of October, 1877.

HIS HONOR THE DEPUTY OF THE GOVER-

On the recomendation of the Honorable the Miraister of Customs, and under the provisions of the 5th section of the Act passed in the Session of the Parliament of Canada, held in the 40th year of Her Majesty's Reign, chaptered 14, and entitled "An act to amend certain Acts respecting cuties of Customs and Excise,"—His Excellency by and with the advice of the Queen's Privy Council of Canada, has been pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the following Regulations governing the allowance of drawback of duty paid an Drawn Tubes and Piping of brass, copper or iron, when actually used in the manufacture of boilers, under the authority of section 5 of the said Act, be and the same are hereby santioned and adopted.

W. A. HIMSWORTH,

The importer claiming drawback under the above quoted Act, shall, in order to entitle himself thereto, deliver to the Collector of Customs at the Port where entry was made and duty paid to such drawn tubes or piping, a declaration in the form No. 1 following; which said declaration shall be susscribed to under oath.

In case the importer is not at the same time the manafacturer of the boilers and cannot therefore from personal knowledge fillium as to the factual use made of such drawn tubes or piping, he shall in place of the form No. 1, make use of the form No. 2, and the manufacturer of the sollers in the construction of which such duty was made on drawn tubes or piping actually made prid on drawn tubes or piping actually mad-use of, shall attack to said declaration No. 2 and subscribe and make oath to a declaration in the rorm No. 3 herete appended.

The Collector of Lustoms at the Port where such entry was made shall thereupon examine the entry and the invoice of such drawn tubes or piping, and shall certify by the form No 4, whether the declaration so produced covers the whole or part of such entered drawn tubes or piping, and whether it corresponds with the value as per invoice and with the amount of duty
