Fred Marsh, a noted counterfeiter of Milwaukee, has been arrested.

The town of Raymond, N. H., was destroyed by fire this week. It had no fire department—not even a hydrant.

The Rev. gentlemen of St. Sulpice seminary have donated \$150,000 and land worth \$75,000 to Laval Medical and Law school in Montreal.

David Block, manufacturer of tinware 146 to 150 Hester street, New York, assigned yesterday, giving preferences aggregating \$88,653. The liabilities are \$132,000, and the assets \$80,000.

The five story marble front building, 30 Read street, New York, was almost wholly destroyed by fire, this week. Boom & Pease blank book manufacturers, industrial printing and binding company, and Frank R. Walker paper manufacturer who occupied the building were burned out. The entire loss is about \$100,000. Covered by insurance.

Two tribes of Indians in the western portion of Vancouver Island are engaged in warfare, as a result of a supply of whisky which they have in some way become possessed. The lighthouse keeper at that point is shut, with his daughter, in the lighthouse in a state of siege. They have telegraphed for a man-of-war to be sent to quell the fighting, and the revenue cutter Quadra, with fifty policemen, have been despatched to the scene of the trouble.

The other day while Mrs. Berkofski of New Haven, was out in the yard, her two year old daughter, having seen her mother clean out the stove a moment before, took a shovel full of red hot coals from the fire, and then, hearing her mother open the door dumped the embers into the baby carriage, in which was Mrs. Berkofski six months old child sleeping. The clothing in the carriage took fire at once as did the little girl's garments. In a moment all was ablaze. The mother rushed to the children's aid, but too late. The little girl died in half an hour. The baby is not expected to live.

HE HAD THIRTEEN WIVES

ON HIS DEATHBED A MEN WARNS SUSPECTIBLE WOMAN.

What Lovely Women Should Beware of.

Love at First Sight and Strange Men With Big Diamonds.

A stranger about forty years old committed suicide in a boarding house at Los Angeles a few days ago. He left a remarkable letter in which he said he was a member of one of the largest and most prominent families of the country, whose ancestors came from Jamestown. After confessing to having committed murder the writer says: "During a period of twenty-one years I have been married to thirteen different women. In every case, except the first, my sole motive was to secure money, not love or affection. I have three children by the first, and one by all the rest except three. One of the women to whom I've been married had \$300,000 in her own right, three others had from \$150,000 to \$200,000 and none of the others was worth less than \$10,000.

HIS GENERAL RULE.

In this sphere my vain and giddy victims were easily captivated, and it was often a case love at first sight with them. 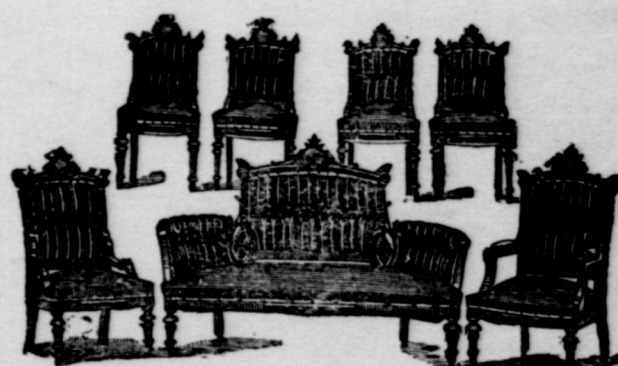
