Cricket. HALIFAX, July 16. The following figures have been arranged with the Germantown Cricket Club during their stay in Halifax: July 25 and 26, vs. Wanderers; July 27 and 28, Garrison; July 29 and 30, Halifax (combined) team.

The week following the visit of the Germantown cricket team will be the Wanderers' grounds, and will be engaged in by representative teams of the cities of Philadelphia, Ottawa and Halifax.

The dates are: August 1 and 2, Philadelphia vs. Halifax; August 3 and 4, Ottawa vs. Halifax; August 5 and 6, Philadelphia vs. Ottawa. A silver cup will be presented to the winning team, and other prizes will be offered for individual preference.

The Globe's Ottawa despatch says that it is probable that Lord Stanley will place his resignation in the British premier's hands before Lord Salisbury leaves office.

The Kingston Whig, Toronto Globe, Woodstock Sentinel, St. Thomas Journal and Brockville Recorder are all advocating the holding of a monster Liberal convention in the autumn. It will probably be held at Toronto.

Gertrude Souine, aged eighteen, of Aroostook, Me., has never laughed or smiled. While intelligent on other matters, any ludicrous event or witticism makes no impression upon her.

It is said of Samuel McDonald Richardson of Baltimore that he was personally acquainted with nearly 49,000 depositors in the savings bank of which he was president, all of them working people of small means.

The Prince of Wales will take the initiative in the grand lodge of Freemasons for granting a substantial sum to the sufferers by the fire in St. Johns, Nfld., from the charitable fund set at the disposition of the grand lodge.

Premier Fielding, of Nova Scotia, spoke at a public meeting in Hanstead, Eng., in favor of Home Rule and "local option." The London Daily News published a summary of his ideas and his whole tone and style made a most excellent impression.

Jean Ingelow, notwithstanding she is past sixty, pursues her amiable hobby of botanical study and flower cultivation, and keeps up her benevolent custom of giving three times a week dinner to twelve poor persons freshly discharged from the hospitals of London.

John McHeron, a Philadelphia cartman, has been somewhat surprised by the receipt of a draft of \$4,600 from a son who was taken with the gold fever about fifteen years ago, and has finally turned up as the superintendent of a rich silver mine in Mexico with an income of \$200,000 a year.

Majority Forty-Two. There have now elected 668 members of the house of commons out of the 670 composing that body.

With the result of the polling in Tipperary which took place Tuesday, and the polling in the Orkney islands, which takes place next week, the contest will be over.

The parties now stand: Conservatives 314; opposition 354. The two remaining districts are certain to return supporters of Mr. Gladstone, so the latter's majority in the next house will be 42. The corrected returns show a net Liberal gain of 56.

The aggregates of the polling up to the present are: Unionist and Conservative, 2,118, 533; Gladstonian, 2,375, 537.
