### Veils and Feathers.

The Canada Farmers' Sun, organ of the Patrons of Industry, of the 5th inst., has the following letter from Prof. Goldwin Smith:

Editor Canada Farmers' Sun:—It is announced that at an official drawing-room at Montreal ladies are to appear in evening dress with court veils and feathers. With trains Her Majesty is graciously pleased on this occasion to dispense, so there will be no trains to be trodden upon. A friend of mine at a ball in one of the colonies had the misfortune to tread on the train of a grand lady. The wearer turned and saluted him in language of which it is enough to say that it savored far more of the station from which she had come, than of that into which, perhaps in her husband's good luck in finding a nugget, she had risen.

This sort of thing has been on the increase of late years. Lord Lisgar, who was the Governor-General when I first came to this country, gave himself no airs of royalty. His social attitude and his hospitalities were simply those of a British nobleman. At Rideau Hall there was no court etiquette or costume. The first Governor-General, I believe, who in any way played the king was Lord Dufferin, during whose reign the expenses of the office were greatly increased. Upon his example his successors have improved, so that Rideau Hall is becoming a comic counterfeit on Buckingham Palace, and the opening of the Dominion Parliament vies, as a display of ineffable dry goods, with the opening of the British House of Lords. Nothing spreads more rapidly among the self-made rich than the love of court etiquette and finery. Yet even Princess Louise, though her royalty was real, not self-assumed, stopped short, I believe, of court veils and feathers.

An extremely expensive office, politically almost a sinecure, seems to be maintained at the cost of our people for the purpose of propagating amongst the self-made rich those vices of vulgar vanity and flunkeyism to which self-made wealth is notoriously most prone. In the old country the veils and feathers have at all events ancient usage in their favor; they are redeemed by historical associations; they are worn with hereditary grace; and, being regarded by their aristocratic wearers as matters of course, do not produce on them the intoxicating effects which they produce upon the wife of a lucky speculator when she finds herself for the first time arrayed in the trappings of Vere de Vere. In a democratic country like ours the ambition of a rich man ought to be to distinguish himself as a good, if possible as a great, citizen; which he may do by promoting the welfare of the community in many ways, even if he does not go into public life. But the tendency of this mock royalty, with its ceremony and tinsel, is to turn rich men, and still more the wives of rich men, from the path of high social duty into that of low social ambition, and in too many cases to infect them with the desire of deserting the equality and simplicity of their own country for the aristocratic drawing-rooms of the old world.

### A Story of Sir John.

Among the residents of Kingston is a certain Mrs. — who is an ardent politician, and worshiped Sir John. This worthy lady is not of a devotional turn of mind, and does not very often trouble the church. On one occasion, however, two or three years ago, she was present. The sermon was on the ingratitude of the Jews, and the way they persecuted the early Christians was commented upon. Mrs. — listened attentively thereto. She was observed by many to be visibly affected. The minister thought that he had made an impression. Some days afterwards he called upon his patient, and after a few commonplaces had passed between them, mentioned that he had noticed her presence in church on the previous Sunday, and observed with satisfaction that his words had not been wholly ineffectual. ### The President on Tariff Reform.

President Cleveland in his annual message to congress, the other day, says, as follows, regarding tariff reform:

The tariff act passed at the last session of the congress needs important amendments if it is to be executed effectually and certainly. In addition to such necessary amendments as will not change rates of duty, I am still very decidedly in favor of putting coal and iron upon the free list. So far as the sugar schedule is concerned, I would be glad under existing aggravations, to see every particle of differential duty in favor of refined sugar stricken out of our tariff law. If, with all the favor now accorded the sugar refining interest in our new tariff laws, it still languishes to the extent of closed refineries and thousands of discharged workmen, it would seem to present a hopeless case for reasonable legislative aid. Whatever else is done or omitted, I earnestly repeat here the recommendation I have made in another portion of this communication, that the additional duty of one-tenth of a cent per pound laid upon sugar imported from countries paying a bounty on its export be abrogated. Exceedingly important considerations point to the propriety of this amendment. With the advent of a new tariff policy not only calculated to relieve the consumers of our land in the cost of their daily life, but to invite a better development of American thrift and create for us closer and more profitable commercial relations with the rest of the world, it follows as a logical and imperative necessity that we would at once remove the chief, if not the only, obstacle which has so long prevented our participation in the foreign carrying trade on the sea. A tariff built upon the theory that it is well to check imports, and that a home market should bound the industry and effort of American producers, was fitly supplemented by a refusal to allow American registry to vessels built abroad, though owned and navigated by our people.

Our new tariff policy, built upon the theory that it is well to encourage such importations as our people need, and that our products and manufactures should find markets in every part of the habitable globe, is consistently supplemented by the greatest possible liberty to our citizens in the ownership and navigation of ships in which our products and manufactures may be transported. Ship-building should be revived by the prospect of profitable employment for ships when built, and the American sailor should be resurrected and again take his place as a sturdy industrious citizen in time of peace and a patriotic and safe defender of American interests in the day of conflict. An ancient provision of our law denying American registry to ships built abroad and owned by Americans appears not only to be a failure for good at every point but to be nearer a relic of barbarism than anything that exists under the permission of a statute of the United States. I earnestly recommend its prompt repeal.
