ARBOR DAY.—F. B. Meagher, School Inspector of the Counties of Carleton, Victoria and Madawaska, has appointed May 10th, to be observed as Arbor day.

A RUNAWAY.—W. B. Belyea's horse Harlowe ran away the other day. He started with the wagon hitched to him, from the stable, ran down Main St., around King St., and up into Glidden's livery stable. He got off without a scratch.

THE DOG CAME BACK.—That is to say, the dog belonging to John Tattersall, that fell from a train between Houlton and Debec last week. He walked calmly into town on Friday covered with mud and somewhat lame. He is recovering.

THE EPWORTH LEAGUE entertained their friends in the vestry of the Methodist Church on Monday evening. Considering the very bad weather the number present was large. After a short musical and literary programme refreshments were served.

ARNOLD ELECTED.—Mr. Frank Foster held a poll at Queen's office in Kings ward for the election of a councillor to fill the vacancy caused by John Sutton's retirement. The only candidate was John Arnold who was nominated by H. N. Payson and declared duly elected.

FIRE ON SATURDAY NIGHT.—Some bright youth distinguished himself Saturday night by setting fire to a huge pile of refuse on the river bank at the end of Queen street. It did not burn furiously, but gave off an offensive smoke that filled the town. The hose cart was run out and the fire extinguished.

FISH AND GAME.—The annual meeting of the Aroostook Fish & Game Association is to be held in Presque Isle, some time in May. There will be a grand banquet, to be served by Landlord Gates, of the Presque Isle House. MAINE RAILROADS.—There will not be very much railroad building in Maine this season, but the average is bound to be kept up. About 24 miles remain to be built on the Wiscasset & Quebec railroad before it reaches Burnham, and Contractor Mitchell, who is in charge, will push along operations as soon as the situation looks a little brighter.—Ee.

IT BROUGHT THE RAIN.—The historic watering cart was pressed into active service on Monday. Unused to severe exertion, while doing a little sprinkling about the corner of Main and Queen streets the axle broke. The cart was out long enough, however, to sustain its reputation, for it was scarcely laid aside for repairs before the rain began to fall.

FROM THE COUNTRY.—Much news of interest will be found in our correspondents column. It is reported from Perth that J. E. Stewart who met with a serious accident is recovering, that the T. V. R'way suffered by the late rains; from Bath that burglars have been at work in C. E. Gallagher store; from Bristol that a bad land slide has occurred on the main highway.

MISS MOREHOUSE, who had been so dangerously ill for some days at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. B. B. Manzer, died yesterday morning at 3 o'clock. The remains were taken last evening to Newburg on the Hudson. They were accompanied by Mr. Morehouse, a relative of deceased, and Mr. Guy Manzer.

BROKE HIS SKULL.—On Saturday a number of men were engaged in raising a barn for Chester Carpenter at Richmond Corner, John McLellan and Roland Hanson were up about twenty feet from the ground when they fell, some timbers falling with them. John McLellan's skull was broken in the fall, and though he was unconscious for some time and is badly hurt he will probably recover. Mr. Hanson escaped without much injury.

JOHNVILLE CHURCH.—The Roman Catholic church at Johnville, has been undergoing a process of renovating for four weeks at the hands of Mr. Frank Stoop, and was finished on the 4th of April. The walls have been tinted mauve, with the arches a deeper shade, and the ceiling a pale gray. The chancel was repapered, and the altar repainted and gilded. The altar is handsomely gilded, with a cross and I. H. S. on the front. The church is now one of the prettiest in the county.

WORK ON THE STREETS.—The street committee is attending to business well. A couple of teams and several men are at work building a good piece of road between Connell's foundry and the bridge. They are filling in with large stones, and over that putting a layer of gravel. It looks as if it might last. On Broadway there has been some improvement made, and the men are at work levelling up Main St. on the north side, as much as it can be done. It would be well if some asphalt could be done on Main street sidewalk. There is a bad bit of walk from the corner of Regent street to the corner of Emerald on the east side of Main street. It is equally as bad from Court street to the jog where His Worship has his business stand. It is hardly possible to put asphalt sidewalk on both sides this year, but a start should be made anyway.

Horrible Treatment.

Charles Glover, a boy of fourteen is dying in St. Michael's hospital, Toronto, the result of ill treatment at the hands of some man who induced him to run away from his home at Campbelltown last June by glowing promises of a life of ease and pleasure in Montreal, and when he got possession of the lad set him at street begging, living off what money he got in this way. Exposure and abuse finally broke down Glover's health, and on December 20th the man put him in the hospital. His pitiful story resulted in detectives communicating with the Campbellton authorities and on Friday Miss Sarah Glover, sister of his adopted father, arrived in Toronto. The boy says he was born in St. John, and that his father, Captain Russell, dying when he was a baby, his mother moved to Moncton and afterwards to Campbellton, where she married Glover, but five years ago left him and Glover then adopted the boy, giving him a good home.

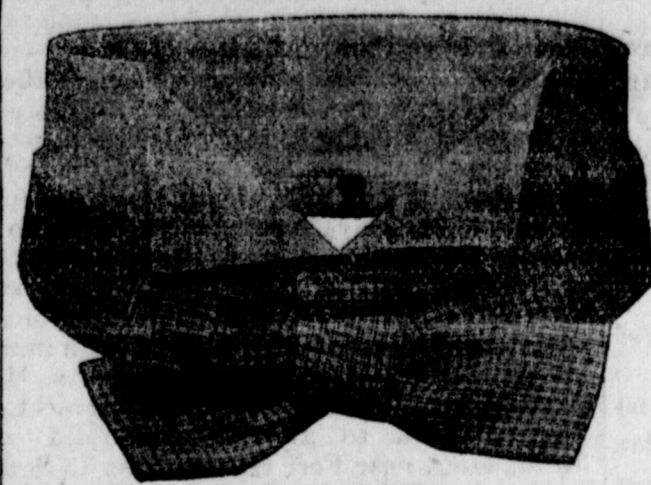

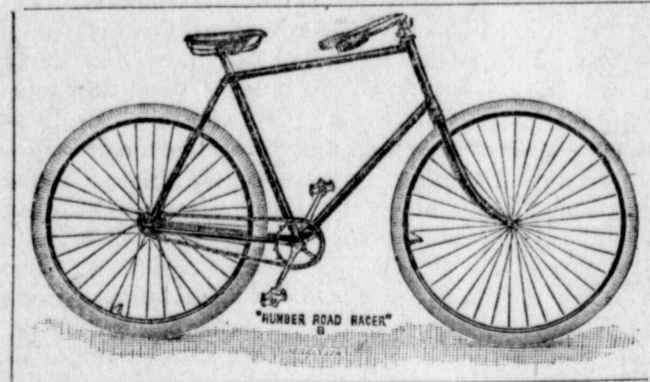
