### LOCAL TOPICS.

**ACQUITTED.**—At the county court last week Issachar Boyer was acquitted of the charge of stealing some \$600.00 from Henry Corcoran.

**GETTING BETTER.**—Mr. Edward Craig who had a severe paralytic stroke is getting along very well. He has recovered the power of speech and can move himself a little.

**POISONED BY CANNED GOODS.**—Rev. John B. Morgan, Jacksonville, and his two children were poisoned last Saturday by eating canned salmon. They are getting somewhat better.

**BRITISH SUBJECTS.**—At the last session of the county court, applications for naturalization were made by T. Emmerson Milmore and Samuel Nicholson. Their petitions were confirmed.

**ELECTRIC LIGHT.**—While the question of electric light is so agitating the town council, it would be well for those citizens who have the ear of the government to pray for a light in front of the post office.

**REV. W. M. S. LOWELL,** who has been assisting Rev. A. F. Baker in the Albert street church, has gone away. The meetings which have been commenced with so much enthusiasm will be continued through the week.

**LIBERAL MEETINGS.**—There was a Liberal meeting in Centreville last night addressed by Mr. Hawke of Moncton. On Thursday evening a Liberal meeting will be held at Debec, on Friday at Kirkland and on Saturday at Benton.

**FIRE AT CANTERBURY.**—A house and barn at Canterbury owned by A. J. Marsten, Woodstock, was burned on Sunday morning. The house was occupied by Mr. Gordwood, school teacher, whose cow died in the flames. There was some insurance on the buildings.

**MR. COSTIGAN.**—Hon. John Costigan, minister of marine and fisheries, was in town last week, spending parts of Wednesday and Thursday at the Wilbur House. Whatever this particular business may have been was not made public. Naturally a large number of the Conservatives called upon the minister, and there was some intention of giving him a public reception. It is understood that he declined this, as he was much affected by the death of Mr. Robert Connors, the well known lumberman, who was his warm personal friend.

**THE WOODSTOCK DEBATING CLUB** is now running in full blast. Last Friday night with John Lindsay in the chair the question of women's suffrage was discussed. When put to a vote the affirmative won the day. The question for next Friday night is "Resolved that it is in the interest of Canada to form a third party for the purposes of prohibition." Mr. Hay leads the affirmative and Mr. Lindsay the negative.

**MILL MAN HURT.**—A young man named Pine, employed in the mill room of the Gibson cotton factory, got one of his hands caught between the wheel and track of the mill, on Friday last, and two fingers were taken off. About the same time another employee in the same department got one of his hands caught in a part of the machinery and had that member so badly jammed that he will be unable to use it for some time to come.—Ex.

**ACCIDENTS.**—Mr. Geo. Connell, met with a painful and serious accident last Friday evening. He slipped on the ice near Queen street station and fell, breaking his hip bone. He was taken home and is resting as comfortable as could be expected.

**HON. JOHN NOMINATED.**—On Friday last a Liberal Conservative convention was held at Grand Falls, to nominate a candidate for the House of Commons at the coming election. It is estimated that there were 500 persons present. J. E. Stewart was in the chair. On motion of B. Kilburn, John Costigan was nominated. L. W. Wilson seconded the nomination which was carried unanimously amid applause. Mr. Costigan was not present, but there is no doubt that he will accept the nomination.

He was about fifty years old and was born and brought up at Peel. He was a son of the late Charles Lloyd. A coroner's jury found a verdict of suicide while insane.

Among instances of those who in Biblical history had given way to this sin and had met with terrible rewards, were mentioned, Baalam, Achan, Gahazi, Saul, and beyond them all in the depth of the sin, Judas. The sermon was attentively listened to by a large congregation.

**STARTING AGAIN.**—The old saw mill at Shogomoc, which has been idle for the past ten years, has been thoroughly repaired and equipped by Messrs F. P. Thompson, R. A. Estey and D. F. George, who purchased it last summer, and will start sawing hemlock boards about the 1st of April with a force of twenty-five hands. It will saw about two and a half millions before closing down for next winter. The mill has been placed in charge of Mr. Fred Estey. The tannery at Hawkshaw, a short distance below Pokio, has been running full blast all winter, thirty five hands being employed. Five or six dwelling houses will be erected during the early summer for the accommodation of some of the employees.—The St. John Globe.
