LYNCH LAW.

A lynching affair is reported from Illinois. It appears that two scoundrels had assaulted a young woman. They were caught and put in jail. Early the following morning, a crowd of citizens surrounded the jail and attempted to force their way in. The jail officials urged patience and the sheriff told the enraged citizens that the men would be tried by a jury and the jury would do its duty.

It is a terrible thing in the history of any country, when the people lose confidence in the course of justice. The Illinois mob does not appear to have been of that unreasonable disposition, which demands no consideration, but rather of the nature of an assembly of citizens determined on the guilt of certain wretches, and confident that the usual course of the law would fail to punish.

CELEBRATE THE FIRST.

There is a movement on foot towards holding a regular First of July celebration in Woodstock. A meeting called for the purpose of considering the matter did not pan out. Public meetings are not over popular affairs. But merchants who have been talked to on the matter, seem well disposed to the departure. As a matter of fact, a real holiday, on which occasion our merchants would close their stores and go in for enjoyment would be a capital affair. Some special attractions would have to be arranged for, such as a trades procession for instance, bicycle races, canoe and boat races, and of course, the ever popular horse race.

Outside towns should be made cognizant of the fact that Woodstock was going to have a day of it, and the result would be lots of strangers, no small amount of money left in the place, and the inevitable good natured feeling which permeates us all after having had a day's real enjoyment.

NEWFOUNDLAND.

The Toronto Mail and Empire says of the Newfoundland question.

Mr. Bond, who took part in the Newfoundland negotiations at Ottawa, is now in Boston endeavouring to borrow the money with which to meet the pressing obligations of the colony. This movement is the result of the determination of the local government not to accept the terms of union which Canada has proposed.

The above journal further writes favoring the admission of Newfoundland when certain promised financial and political reforms are consummated in the island.

Without doubt Canada is not in a position to assume fresh financial obligations just now.

ENCROACHMENTS ON OUR STREETS.

At the meeting of the council on Monday evening, when the question of streets was up, the mayor and Coun. Payson indulged in a bit of pleasant railery in regard to the tendency of some of our principal merchants to encumber the sidewalks on Main street with dry goods boxes, and fish stands. After some discussion of the question of encroachment on the street in general it was voted that town surveyor Stone should run the lines on Houlton road from the Lower Corner to John Driscoll's place. It seems to be tacitly understood that members of the council only, will be exempt from obeying the law in regard to encroachment.

FIRE CRACKERS.

While it is well that the youth of Woodstock should be loyal and patriotic, and should so comport themselves on the Queen's birthday as to leave that estimable lady in no doubt as to their regard for her, yet human ingenuity might find some outlet for the youths' regard quite as expressive as fire crackers and somewhat less dangerous. After suffering for a number of years from bad fires, frightened horses and worse frightened women, other towns have proscribed the gay and festive fire cracker, and, bearing in mind our own recent 24th, it might occur to our town council to give the matter their consideration.

FREIGHT RATES.

The Northern Leader says: "The C. P. Railway Co. and the B. & A. R. R. Co. have reduced the rate on shingles, to take effect June 1st, from 53cts. per thousand to 42cts. to Boston, and from 51cts. to 40cts. to Portland. Competition did it." If another line was constructed from Woodstock to Houlton, our merchants might have something to be thankful for in the way of freight rates.

Central American Nation.

WASHINGTON, May 27.—New treaties of far-reaching importance have recently been made between Nicaragua and Honduras, and official copies have just been received in Washington. They were finally put into effect by proclamation on the 15th of last month.

These treaties take a step towards the forming of a Central American nation out of several small republics—Nicaragua, Honduras, Guatemala, Salvador and Costa Rica. The first treaty forms a defensive alliance in case of foreign war and an offensive alliance against common enemies. It obliterated commercial frontiers, so that foreign goods once admitted to one country are free to enter the other. An express provision is made against the possibility of war between the countries by an article requiring differences to be adjusted by arbitration by some government on the American continent.

There has been more or less conjecture as to the information of a Central American nation, but this treaty appears to be the first practical step towards its accomplishment. Its proclamation at Tegucigalpa on April 15th was followed by a meeting at Managua of the ministers of Salvador, Honduras and other republics with a view of carrying out article 53 for acceptance of the bill in other countries.

A text of another Nicaragua-Honduras treaty has also been received. It provides for the arbitration of their secondary question by a commission to be chosen by the two countries, and if an agreement on the commission is not made, then Spain is constituted final arbitrator.

British Politics.

In a speech on the evening of the 24th of May before the Conservative Union, London, Hon. A. J. Balfour said:—The burden of political action rested not upon the house of commons, where the government was playing out a dull and pitiful comedy, but upon the electoral organizations outside the house. The time was near when an appeal to the country would be inevitable. He was not certain when the government would abandon its hopeless task of trying to legislate, but it would be the business of the opposition to make the date as soon as possible. (Cheers.) Next week might bring the downfall of the ministry. It might, however, outlive the session, but unless there was a great and unparalleled change in public opinion it could not long survive. In conclusion he urged party organizations everywhere to be ready for a general election.

It has never occurred to him or to Lord Melbourne, nor upon consultation could they tell what to do. Suddenly the Queen herself relieved their dilemma. "Queen Anne," said she "must have worn the Garter." There was a rush to look at the picture of the illustrious lady in her State robes in Windsor gallery. They found she wore the Garter on her arm, and the Duke was much relieved.

Newfoundland Bank Directors Committed for Trial.

James Goodfellow, James Pitts, Frederick Goodridge, George Hutchins, and Edwin Dudge, directors, and Henry Cook, manager of the defunct Commercial Bank of St. Johns were on the 24th committed for trial in the Supreme Court upon the charge of having made false statements as to the bank's condition. The committing magistrates stated there was no charge whatever of personal dishonesty against them.

Oscar Wilde.

The trial of Oscar Wilde was concluded on Saturday, 25th inst., when he was found guilty of the charges preferred against him. Both he and his friend Taylor, who had been previously found guilty, were sentenced to two years imprisonment with hard labor.

The Mineral Springs factory, at Havelock, Kings county, was completely destroyed by fire on the evening of the 25th. The fire originated in the barns, which were also destroyed. Rev. Mr. McNeil lost a valuable carriage, sleigh and harness. The factory was completely destroyed with contents, excepting one piece of machinery which was gotten out uninjured. The mill of Corey Bros. was also on fire, but the flames were extinguished before making much headway. Had the wind been blowing in the direction of the Springs hotel nothing could have saved it. Every effort was made to save the factory, but it burned very rapidly. It is not known how the fire originated. The loss of the factory will throw a number of hands out of employment, as the company was doing a rushing business and daily sending out large consignments of goods. Considerable freight was in the express office for the company to be delivered the next morning.
