WILL NEWFOUNDLAND COME?

The condition of affairs in Newfoundland as truly deplorable. Political chaos has been followed by financial shipwreck, and everything in the lonely isle is at sixs and sevens. But while Newfoundland's position is wretched, it is not hopeless, and probably she will come out of the ordeal purified. Communities, like individuals, have often to be tried in the fire of adversity.

It has been suggested that Newfoundland be made a Crown colony. That is, she would no longer have representative government, but would be governed by a commission appointed by the Imperial authorities. It has been said, that such is the only condition on which financial men in London will give their support, in aiding the islanders in their distress.

It is also quite natural, that the idea of Newfoundland cominginto the Canadian Confederation should receive an impetus just now, and it will not be altogether a matter of suprise, if such is the outcome. The British Government is anxious for such a move, the Canadian Premier is said to favor it; and judging from a recent article in the Toronto Globe, the Liberals will offer no factious opposition.

It is true, we are not crowded for room for our people. Territory is not the one thing needful. We are not like the Englishman, who, as some wag has remarked, is always in danger of tumbling off his bit of land. But desperate cases, require desperate remedies, and if the Newfoundlanders were once requested to come into the confederation, there is no special reason, should they desire to join us now, for our turning the cold shoulder

As requested by the council, Mr. Dibblee has made out his bill in detail and will sub mit it to this session of the council; and he states that he has now in hands of moneys collected under the Scott Act sufficient to

pay the same. The committee have used their best endeavors to have the inspector enforce the Act during the year and we believe he has been successful in a large measure, in doing much to restrict the sale of intoxicating liquors through the county.

The collection of fines during the year has not been as large as in former years. This is in part due to the fact that some of the parties against whom the fines are, reside in districts where it is extremely difficult to get at them and occure them.

Estey, John Ronald, and John Mc-Lauchlan, on account of their action on James Carr's father for a rebate of taxes on some land in the county. The action of the valuators was attacked by Couns. Melville and Moore who moved that Donald Munro, John R. Tompkins and Henry Scholey be appointed in their stead. Mr. Munro refused to be made a valuator and John Mc-Lauchlan's name was substituted for his. The old valuators, defended by W. S. Saunders, Andrew Colwell, G. L. Cronkhite, Joseph Merrithew and others, were reap-

The motion to allow James Carr a rebate on taxes on wild land was passed.

On the question of a Scott Act Inspector, Coun. Munro moved, seconded by Coun. Shaw, that the salary be \$400.00, the same as last year.

Coun. Williams moved, seconded by Coun. Gibson, that the salary be \$300. The original motion was carried.

Mr. Myles of the Woodstock Woolen Mills, by permission addressed the Council.
