WENT TO BRISTOL.—Past Grand Master D. F. Merritt, Deputy Grand Secretary, Rev. J. B. Morgan, and County Master David Hipwell, went to Bristol yesterday to attend the annual session of the Carleton County Orange Lodge.

A SACRED CONCERT will be given in the Benton Baptist Church on Tuesday evening Feb. 12. A musical and literary programme will be the order of the evening. Rev. A. F. Baker will deliver an address. The proceeds will be devoted to paying the debt on the church organ.

MUSICAL AND LITERARY.—A musical and literary entertainment will be held in the parlors of Mrs. R. K. Jones, on Thursday evening, under the auspices of the W. C. T. U. The programme will consist of readings, vocal solos, duets, quartets and piano solos. It threatens to be a pleasant affair.

HAT BLOWN OFF.—Harry Black Amherst, N. S. received a letter from his brother Edgar, who is now living in Butte, Mont., saying that in the recent explosion during the fire at the Montana Central railway yards he had his hat blown from off his head, while many standing around him were instantly killed.—Sun

A LARGELY ATTENDED meeting of the stockholders of the Wiscasset & Quebec Railroad, Thursday, voted to bond the road for \$400,000 to build the road to Burnham and to a connection with the Bangor & Aroostook and C. P. Railways. The issue of \$300,000 in bonds voted last October was cancelled. General Manager Fogg has resigned. (Maine Farmer.)

FIRE AT EDMUNDSTON.—The building occupied by the Peoples Bank at Edmundston was completely destroyed by fire Saturday morning. They were repairing the building and had a big fire in a stove in the ell and the wood ignited from a hot stove pipe. The bank lost some books and other articles, but just what their loss is at present unknown. The building was insured for \$2,000.

MR. EDWARD JONES, a long time resident of Woodstock, died quite suddenly about noon of Thursday last. He had been in ill health for many years past, but his end was not anticipated so soon. He was on the street the morning of the day of his death. At one time Mr. Jones was health inspector. The funeral was on Saturday and was conducted by Rev. C. T. Phillips and Rev. Dr. Chapman. Mr. A. E. Jones, who conducts a hardware store on King street, and was a member of last year's town council, is a son of the deceased.

NEW PHOTOGRAPH GALLERY.—Messrs. W. L. Parsons and J. McBlaine intend opening up a photograph gallery here. The firm's name will be Parsons & Blaine. Mr. Parsons has had several years experience with some of the largest galleries in Boston, and Mr. Blaine has been engaged with Climo, of St. John. With such a wide experience this new firm will doubtless do a good business. They will start operations this week in the gallery directly over A. J. Marsten's grocery store; entrance first door above W. B. Belyea's.

PROHIBITION CONVENTION.—Between fifty and sixty men from the different parishes of the county met at R. T. of T. hall Florenceville on Monday for the purpose of organizing the prohibition party of Carleton county. L. E. Young, Woodstock, was chosen as president; Dr. Ross, of Florenceville, vice president; J. G. Calkins, East Florenceville, secretary; J. S. Simondson, Centerville, treasurer; executive officers for the different parishes were chosen. It was unanimously agreed that it was desirable to put a prohibition candidate in the field at the next Dominion election and J. K. Flemming was nominated on the second ballot which nomination was unanimous.

THEY WANT TIME.—The Press contains a notice of a bill to amend the act intitled an "Act to Incorporate the Woodstock and Centerville Railway company" to be presented at this session of the legislature. The company wants to be allowed four years, before they start to build the road and nine years before they finish it. Why not be allowed a half a century for such an immense undertaking?

SUING THE COMPANY.—It was mentioned in THE DISPATCH some weeks ago that Prosper Curriere, who fell from the bridge last summer was about to sue the Canadian Bridge Co'y for damages. He has done so, and claims \$5000 damages. A commission has been issued from the superior court of Quebec, to Mr. J. N. W. Winslow for the examination of witnesses in Woodstock. Mr. Winslow will hear the examination and forward the testimony. Fisher & A. B. Connell for the plaintiffs here and J. J. Gallagher for the bridge company.

KIND WORDS.—Reference was made in the last issue of this paper to the sudden death of Mrs. W. Z. Earle which occurred last week in Houlton. A Presque Isle correspondent to the Fort Fairfield Beacon writes: "Mr. and Mrs. Earle made Presque Isle their home for about eight months, coming here strangers, but when they left about one month ago they were certainly the opposite. Mrs. Earle was remarkably easy in her manners; not the least distant or haughty in her appearance, but noble and womanly. In society her presence was always felt. No person with an acquaintance of only a few months, did a people mourn more deeply than do the people of Presque Isle the death of Mrs. Earle; to Mr. Earle, whose loss is fully realized, they extend their deepest sympathy."

Toasts and speeches were in order and the party adjourned at a late hour with "God Save the Queen."
