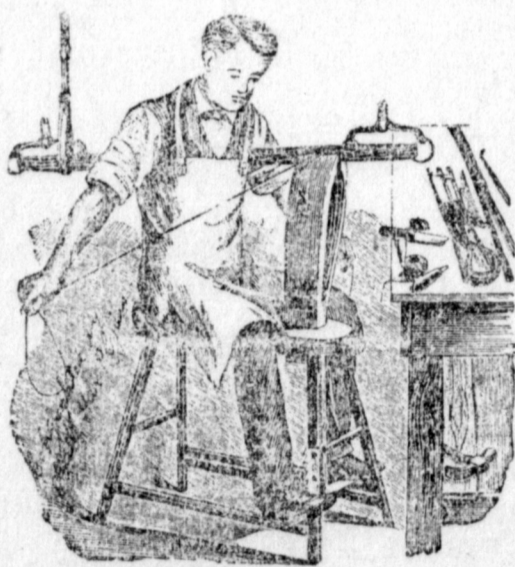

Tattooing.
Slaves and captives taken in war were graven with marks or pictorial emblems in various parts of the body; soldiers, certain workmen, and criminals were similarly treated; and "the followers of several divinities" habitually tattooed themselves. Religion and fetishism have influenced the practice in many countries and amongst peoples differing from one another in most other accustomed practices. Moses forbade it expressly to the Hebrews: "Ye shall not make any cuttings in your flesh for the dead, nor print any marks upon you." Mohammed seemed to forbid it in the Koran, but many Arabs frequent the tattooer, and his art is in great honor amongst the Kabyles of the desert. These, and the Mohammedan negroes who follow the usage, say that before entering Paradise they undergo a purification by fire, which cleanses them of all terrestrial and idolatrous marks. The early Christians were frequently graven with a cross in the palm of the hand or on the arm. A Council of the Fathers banned the custom; but it was not easily abolished, and a French author says that pilgrims and visitors to the Holy Land were often tattooed on the wrist or arm "with signs representing the cross or the monogram of Christ." In various towns both in Italy and France professional tattooers haunt the neighborhood of certain churches and press their services upon those who enter. This must have been to some extent a religious usage of the ancient Egyptians, for pointing and cutting instruments recognised as belonging to the tattooer have been found in the oldest tombs.

The divers methods of the ancients, says Berchon, are perpetuated in almost every race, and have been recognized most particularly in Oceania, where the Marquesans, the Tahitians, and, in general, the tribes of the yellow Polynesians, still use by preference the practice of tattooing by puncture or pricking, while the darker-hued Oceanians join with that the tattooing by cutting or incision. In some of the South Sea islands and in some of the Asiatic isles there are varieties of the operation which recall the more or less illegitimate tattooing by burning, where the instrument employed is fired to a red heat. The black race in Africa, particularly, has recourse to a cutting process, afterwards rubbing into the wound an irritating substance, which causes a ridge or protuberance. Sometimes the instrument used is a red-hot knife; but this is not tattooing proper.

In European countries at this day there is probably no other method than that by puncture or pricking with needles. This is, at all events, by far the commonest process, Berchon says that a form of burning may be used occasionally (he does not, I think, cite an instance), a small quantity of gunpowder being disposed with art on the spot where the design is to be traced, and carefully exploded. Ordinary needles of various sizes are used. These, to the number of three or five, are fastened with threads between two small pieces of wood, or inserted in a small cork, the points of the needles being on a level. The design, of whatever nature, may be picked out directly with this instrument, or the operator may trace it first upon the skin—which should be stretched as tightly as possible—with pen or pencil. Some tattooers have their designs pricked on paper, which is used as a sort of sieve, the coloring matter being shaken through the holes, after which the needles are brought into play. Occasionally, says Berchon, the tattooers "have models of designs, fashioned in wood garnished with sharp points, which are driven into the skin in such a manner that the operation is performed at a single stroke." This method, he adds, is very rare. The needles are inserted perpendicularly or in a slightly oblique direction, and during the operation they must be dipped from moment to moment in the liquid which holds the coloring matter. The designs, simple or elaborate, take but a very short time to complete under the fingers of skilful operator. Lacassagne has seen "fairly complicated patterns executed in half an hour."

Intoxication By Chloralose.
Dr Herxan describes a case of this kind in the Revue Medicale de la Suisse Romande. The patient was suffering from phthisis and twenty grains of chloralose were administered. An hour later he became collapsed—pale unconscious, covered with sweat, and with a flickering and very rapid pulse. Every fifteen or thirty seconds he had convulsive movements of the extremities and of the muscles of mastication. Ether was administered subcutaneously, and after two hours the contractions ceased, and in four hours the patient had recovered. Dr Herxan says that his patient was used to morphia and chloral, and the very profound effects produced by a medium dose of the drug suggest that a considerable amount of care should be used in its administration.

A Tariff Project.
The Right Hon. James Lowther, M. P., has a tariff project which embraces a sliding scale of duties for Britain. The price at which wheat can be grown in England and be profitable to all, even to the farmer's coachman and footman, is fixed by Mr. Lowther at 40s a quarter, about \$1.22 a bushel. According to his scheme duties will cease to be levied when wheat reaches this price, but he does not say what will keep it there after some one runs in a ship load. He has to await, however, the simplicity of the British people. Mr. Bowell is hampered by no such difficulty, and there is no explanation given why he does not put up wheat to \$1.22 at once.

Vegetarian Sects of China.

The Vegetarian sects of China are numerous. They have their origin in the doctrine of the transmigration of souls, taught by Buddhist and Taoist, and though not sanctioned by Confucius, yet received by many of his disciples. There are two classes of them, the Constant and Varying Vegetarians. The "Constant" make a vow to abstain absolutely till death. The "Varying Vegetarians" only vow to abstain on certain days of each month, as, for example, on January 8; February 7, 9, 16, 19; on March 3, 6, 13, and so on; others are more exacting, and take no meat from the 1st to the 19th of of January, June, and September; others again fast for the first half of January, July, and October. Sometimes they specially abstain on the days when all others are feasting. In all cases the more rigid the abstinence, and the greater the number of years through which it is practised, the more valuable is the merit accumulated, and this being coin current in two worlds, a large acquisition of it is no mean object of ambition. It is supposed to insure good sons, great wealth, high literary degree, and, in the land of shades, a not unenviable lot. The Vegetarians are associated with the cult of Kwan Yin, the Goddess of Mercy. Though spoken of as a goddess, she is by no means always represented as such. Indeed, the original image through which Kwan Yin was worshipped was that of a man. The feeling that the qualities exhibited by Kwan Yin are those that we naturally attribute to motherhood has been the probable cause of her now being almost always represented as a woman, at times Madonna-like, holding a child in her arms. She always appears as a deliverer, and assumes the form of being best suited to accomplish her end under the existing circumstances. The object of her existence is to save. She is the patron divinity of the Vegetarians, and one might expect that her worship would be earnest and simple. A careful reading of the Vegetarian books, however, shows that the bane of heathenism is here felt to the full. Her favor is only to be obtained after the accumulation of sufficient merit. The king, or litany, most in use by the Vegetarians in Central China is the "Kao wang kwan shi yin king." It is repeated by them at each performance of their rites, and consists of a mere jumble of sounds. If this king is recited a thousand times, personal happiness is secured; ten thousand repetitions will secure the happiness of a whole family. Marvellous are the stories told of its efficacy. The rites of the vegetarians are celebrated in private houses, and consist chiefly in the chanting of these litanies. The more earnest among them will occasionally stand up in the streets and exhort men to virtue. The sects all set high value upon purity of life, and many of the members are celibates. By the people at large the rank and file are regarded as a simple and harmless folk, but the motives of their leaders are suspected. Some members of these vegetarian sects have joined the Christian church, and proved earnest and devoted men.—Sunday at Home.

Our Jury System.

Why should the jurymen be secluded from ordinary intercourse with the world while performing that part of his duties as a citizen which is comprised in jury service? The present practice in Great Britain, and in most portions of the United States, is, practically, to say to them, "You are weak and untrustworthy men, and in order to preserve you from temptation we must shut you up." This is not a practice conducive to strength and manliness, nor is it an efficient barrier against corruption, since if this be intended, a dishonest jurymen can be seen before the charge of the judge, or even before the trial shall begin. It is not strange that men look with aversion upon jury service, and will resort to every possible expedient rather than submit, even during a limited period, to be cut off from all knowledge of affairs of the outside world, and especially of what affects their families. In all other employments we may count with some certainty upon stated hours, but here a man does not know, when he leaves his home in the morning whether he can return at the close of the day, or at some latter hour. There is no more reason why jurymen should be kept in continuous session until the termination of a matter entrusted to them than there is for the keeping of other people in such a situation. It is worth consideration and trial, at least, to discover whether men who now shrink from jury service would not be willing to perform this duty if they would not be exposed to these unnecessary hardships.
