Mrs. John Street, is visiting friends in Middle Simonds and Woodstock.

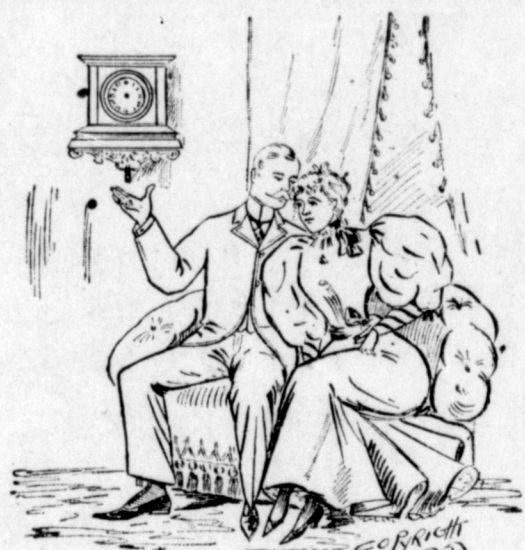
Mrs. C. H. Holmes and daughter have been visiting friends at Bristol.

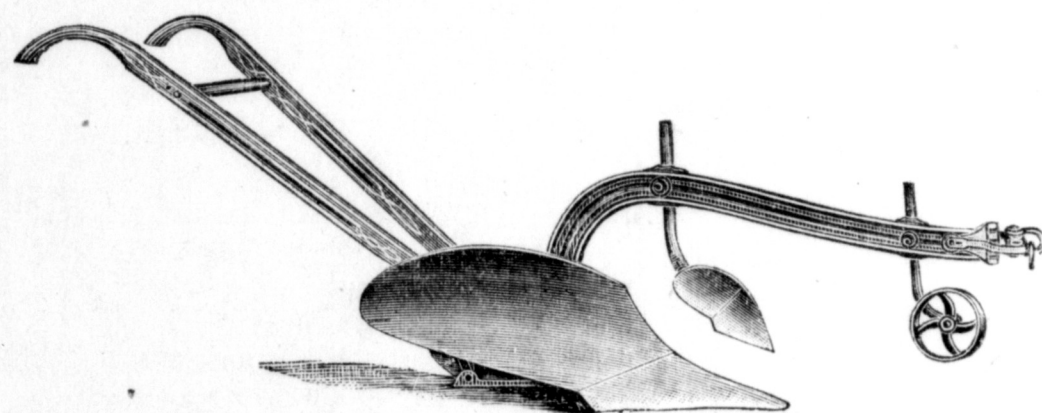
