

Back to the Farms.

A movement of population from the cities back into the country is noted in Minnesota. The Minneapolis Tribune regards the recession in urban growth as an encouraging sign, and so it probably is. We shall be much surprised if our own Massachusetts census does not exhibit a similar population movement in progress here. All over the country the drift to the cities has been too general and extensive for a decade and a half past to meet the demands of a natural and healthful adjustment between populations engaged in agriculture and populations engaged in manufacturing, transportation, and professional and personal services. The latter avenues of employment have been terribly overcrowded and the coming on of hard times has compelled something of a halt in this remarkable march of the population to the cities.

Fifty years ago economists estimated that about one-half of the working population of a country which was self-sufficient in all lines of industry would be needed on the farms to establish a healthy industrial equilibrium. Since then there has been such improvement in machinery for farm work and its application in America to such advantage on broad areas of rich virgin soil as to materially modify this estimate for the United States in particular. That is to say, the same number of men engaged on the soil can today produce a much larger quantity of food and raw material for manufacturing than they could 50 years ago. But since America is producing a vastly larger quantity of food and raw material than it uses—is doing agricultural work for a considerable body of manufacturing located outside the country—we should say that notwithstanding the improvements in farm machinery, an estimate of 50 per cent. for the population which should be at work on the farms in the United States under natural and healthful industrial conditions were none too high. And yet the census of 1890 shows, in a bulletin lately published, that hardly 40 per cent. of the working population was at that time engaged on the farms.—Springfield Republican.

Labor-Saving Machinery.

It is well known how ingenious machinery has well-nigh revolutionized the once intricate work of the carpenter, leaving only the simplest part of the trade for manual labor. Never was this innovation of patented devices more marked than between 1880 and 1890, yet there were 53,547 carpenters in the United States in the former year, while there were 140,621 in 1890, and the average wages of the latter were \$675 as against \$450 for those who had far less machinery to contend with. Between the same years great strides were made in the molding and handling of brick by machinery, yet the number of workmen doubled while the number of yards was but slightly increased, and the wages advanced from an annual average of \$228 to \$390. In few industries has the saving of labor by machinery been more marked than in the manufacture of furniture, and the cheapening of the product has simply been amazing; yet the number of men employed in it increased from 55,304 in 1880 to 92,304 in 1890, wages advancing from an average of \$453 to \$527. This line of evidence might be pursued throughout the list of industries where, for any considerable time, machinery has been doing the work of brains and hands. The conclusion forced is that the introduction of labor-saving machinery is not to reduce permanently the number of employees, but simply to readjust the working force and insure higher wages.

Efforts to Colonize Africa.

The Liberian minister to Great Britain, Rev. Dr. Wilmot Blydes, one of the leading divines of this country, has been in Baltimore this week. His purpose is to encourage negro emigration from the South to Liberia. He says:

"Africa can never be successfully colonized by the white race, as they cannot become adapted to the climate. The only means by which Africa can be evangelized, colonized, and civilized is through the agency of the American negro.

"The black race is destined to go back to Africa and to rule that country. At some future time there will be a large exodus of negroes from the United States to Africa, but not now—not probably for generations to come. There are lessons to be learned in the house of their bondage, both by the negroes and their former masters, before a large exodus to Africa would be anything but a peril and a stumbling-block to the cause of genuine African progress. Enough will go to keep the way open and to produce a healthy impression upon the stagnant barbarism of the African continent, but not enough to make the slightest impression upon the numerical status of the negro population of this country.

"Neither France nor England is disposed to stop the progress of Liberia on the African continent if she is able to advance in the interests of civilization. The recent treaties will not make any change in the political or commercial status of the republic. There is still ample room for material development, and there are more reliable guarantees for peace and order among the neighboring aborigines."—Baltimore Journal of Commerce.

The Elections in New South Wales.

While the mother country was returning a Conservative majority, New South Wales, of the colonies, cast its vote almost as emphatically in the opposite direction. Mr. G. H. Reid appealed to the country against a coalition headed by Sir Henry Parkes and Sir G. R. Dibbs. Sir Henry Parkes stood as an advocate of Federation first, while Sir George Dibbs stood as an out-and-out Protectionist. Mr. Reid's programme asked the constituents to send him up a majority as a protest against the Second Chamber. Mr. Reid proposed to abolish life membership, and to substitute a suspensive for absolute veto no bills sent up from the Lower House. It was understood that he favored some form of referendum. The result of the appeal to the electors was the return of sixty-two Free Traders and forty Protectionists. The Labor Party elected twenty-three members. Mr. Reid, therefore, just missed having a clear majority over both the other sections; but as he will probably be able to make terms with the Labor Party, he will have a working majority of about forty. Sir Henry Parkes, Sir G. R. Dibbs, Mr. B. R. Wyse, and every member of Sir Henry Parkes' Federal Party were defeated at the poll; in fact, the protectionist coalition was as badly hit in its leaders in New South Wales as the Liberal party was in the English elections.—From "The Progress of the World," in the September Review of Reviews.
